MONTERRY, Mex. -- (U.P.) Trial Judge Jesus B. Santos said Friday Dr. Arthur F. Torrance, world traveler and tropical disease expert, will be held in prison for the murder of his wealthy wife at least until Dec. 30 despite winning a high court appeal from his formal indictment on the

charge. Judge Santos admitted that his indictment of Dr. Torrance had been declared invalid by State Attorney General Ramirez Viella. but indicated the defense appeal had been sustained on "techical" grounds.

Dr. Torrance was formally com-mitted to prison by Judge Santos on Nov. 27 after being accused of murdering his bride of three weeks, wealthy Mrs. Ada Cook Lovelend Torrance, Kalamazoo, Mich.

Judge Santos, under Mexican law, is given the alternative of taking his decision to the Mexican supreme court or releasing Torrance.

This decision must be made within five days. Santon said that "under no condition" will Dr. Torrance be released before Dec. 30. His statement was taken to indicate he planned to carry the matter to the highest court.
