80 Ski Cadets Have First Drill Despite Cold

Despite below zero temperatures, 80 members of the University of Wisconsin Reserve Officers Training Corps, equipped with their own skis and poles, Saturday went through the first drills of the first battalion of its kind in the country.

The idea of Col. H. H. Lewis, ROTC commandant, the ski battalion drew a surprisingly large number of hopefuls, although only two of the eight instructors from the Hoopers club appeared to lead the training.

Lieut. R. C. Storey, the officer in charge, explained the winter-long ski training will include teaching the students to care for themselves in a frigid climate, practical combat principles on snow and wooded terrain, and eventually sniping and camouflage. Practice fields are the west side of Bascom hill, Picnic Point, Blackhawk knoll, and the Cross Plains Hoopers hill.

First application of the patrol's skiing ability will come next month during the university's annual Winter carnival, when the cadets will hold a cross country military ski race, with full pack and rifle. At the end of the course, the ski troopers will have to shoot down balloons from the air, and for every balloon missed, have points deducted from their race scores.

WHA to Broadcast De Vinney's Course on War Problems

Interracial problems which aggravated the war will be discussed by Prof. Leland De Vinney in his course, "Contemporary Social Problems," on Monday and Wednesday of this week while WHA microphones eavesdrop on the class to permit individual listeners to hear also.

Prof. De Vinney believes that contemporary racial theories and attitudes, as well as superiority and inferiority complexes are particularly responsible for the present world situation. The two lectures selected for broadcasting will examine the foundations and characteristics of these racial animosities.

Good Listening: WHA Players

Radio schools can be found in abundance throughout the country, but the opportunity of working under actual broadcast conditions is a unique feature offered to the radio-minded

talented student on the University of Wisconsin campus, through the facilities of the Station WHA. Such an opportunity comes to each of the WHA players.

Every year between 350 and 400 young people try out for membership in the WHA players. There are no pledge plans to wear for the 35 who are chosen, and put on the call list. Each is merely designated as a WHA player. Only 22 to 25 of these see active service. Active service means many hours of time given gratis, because the director, Gerald Bartell, uses them in 13 different programs every week.

"Gerry," the pleasant-voiced navigator in "A Chapter a Day," has a major job in this directorship, which he has been handling for over a decade. The players may be spotted only for short dramatizations in "School of the Air," "College of the Air," and other programs, but for each presentation there must be a script written; then Joyce Jaeger (Mrs. Bartell in private life) edits the script. Then comes casting, followed by rehearsals, followed by additions of music and sound effects; finally the presentation itself. If it is to be a transcription, this is usually done the night preceding.

There are only four programs of the 13 which require this, but they are very effective for the participants, giving them a chance to appraise their own work.

The outstanding program, in which the WHA players appear exclusively, is "The Playbill of the American Theater," heard Wednesday from 4 to 4:30 p. m. This series of dramatizations has been following the rise and development of our theater from colonial days to the present time. Adaptations for radio from the original plays have been made by Romance Koopman, script writer.

(Mrs. Koopman's fame has rapidly spread. Many of her scripts are being sought by other radio stations throughout the nation.) The original music has been written by Don Voegel and played by an NYA ensemble.

The old Yankee Critic, Ben Park, serves as narrator. The second semester schedule has been suitably changed to give plays showing what America is living for and working for. This new series will be called "The Heritage of Humanity."

When you consider that every half-hour program requires about four and one-half to five hours of rehearsals, the sum total hours given by each of these players is tremendous. It is little wonder that students come from all over the country to receive training here, for each year as they graduate, with hours of actual broadcasting behind them, most of them have found excellent radio positions with the major networks.

Milwaukee Road Cuts Train Time

Service on the Milwaukee Road between Milwaukee and Chicago will be speeded beginning Monday.

The 85-mile run will be clipped off in 75 minutes, from start to stop, by 14 of the trains in the road's fleet of 27 that operate daily between the two cities. Four will make the run in 80 minutes and others will operate on 85 and 90 min. schedules. A new train will leave Milwaukee at 10:30 p. m., arriving in Chicago at 11:45 p. m., in time for connections with trains for the East and South.

Four high-speed trains will be operated without change of cars between Chicago-Milwaukee and Green Bay, beginning Monday.

Western Union Workers to Buy Defense Bonds

The Western Union Telegraph Co. has inaugurated a plan of weekly deductions from pay checks to enable its 52,000 employees to purchase defense bonds conveniently. A. G. Tappen, manager of the Madison office, announced Saturday.

Each employee will specify the amount he wishes deducted, and when the required figure has been reached the company will purchase and deliver a defense savings bond, registered as the employee directs.
