Put one and one-third cups sugar in a hot aluminum fry pan and stir with a wooden spoon until sugar melts. Do not allow it to become dark. Add boiling water very slowly, stirring constantly and shuner gently until sugar is entirely melted. Add butter, two-thirds cup of sugar, mix thoroughly, then gradually add the cream, bring to bolling point and boll without stirring to 234 degrees F., or until candy will form a very soft ball when tried in cold water. Remove from heat leave undisturbed until cool, then add salt and beat and stir with a spoon until candy begins to look sugary. Pack into a barrel of a full recipe cooky press and form into desired shapes on unoiled aluminum cooky sheets.
