

Dramatic Story Of Life In Theatre Told At The Lyric

"City Of Marked Girls" Is Title Of Hit Due To Open Tuesday; "Stolen Paradise" Is Second Film On Double Bill

The baby was taken to St. Vincent's hospital. Attendants said the boy was healthy, weighing seven pounds and 14 ounces.

LIMA'S BIRTHDAY BALL TO BE HELD ON FRIDAY, JAN. 31, SAYS CHAIRMAN

The annual President's Birthday Ball, proceeds of which will go toward the fight against infantile paralysis, will be held in Memorial hall Friday evening, Jan. 30.

This announcement was made Monday by Charles O. Guy, Allen-co's general chairman.

The 1942 event has been designated the "Diamond Jubilee Celebration" in observance of the President's 60th birthday.

Special activities in connection with the local fund campaign will see the setting up of a "Wishing Well," a novel arrangement to be erected in a prominent downtown location, for the convenience of pedestrians desiring to contribute toward the fund.

There also will be the "March of Dimes," a big feature which annually makes the infantile paralysis fund campaign more notable, and the distribution of "Wishing Well" coin collectors to be distributed in prominent locations by members of the police and fire department.

A goal of \$2,000 has been set for this year. Last year the affair netted more than \$1,000. Fifty per cent of the proceeds will be retained by the Allen-co Infantile Paralysis Fund, managed by the Allen-co permanent committee of which George B. Quatman is chairman and Dale Crement, treasurer, and 50 per cent will go to the national infantile paralysis foundation.

Chairman Guy, who received his appointment from J. E. Troutman, chairman of the National Special Events Committee, Monday announced several chairmen of committees which will lend their assistance toward the affair's success.

Annual essay writing contest for pupils in Lima and Allen-co schools, sponsored by William Paul Gallagher post of the American Legion, was formally declared open Monday.

Contestants will have the opportunity of winning one of several local prizes and a chance of being given a free trip to the nation's capital, Washington, D. C.

Topic of this year's contest is "The System of Checks and Balances in the Federal Constitution and Its Relation to the Individual Citizen."

Contest plans were announced by Harry Wedgen, the post's commander, Fred Short, chairman of the post's committee on Americanism, already has arranged for participation by students at Lima South, Central, St. Johns, St. Rose, St. Gerards, Shawnee and Elda schools.

All essays should contain no less than 400 words and not more than 600 words. Essays will be graded on content, form and style, originality, value and sequence of thought, choice of language, clarity of expression, sentence structure, paragraphing and mechanics.

Rules of the contest provide for all essays being legibly written or typewritten on one side of 8 1/2 by 11 paper and bound with pins or fasteners in covers of plain white paper.

The essay contest closes Feb. 20. All essays must be in the hands of post or county Youth Education chairman not later than midnight that date.

All pupils of the 8th, 10th, 11th and 12th grades of all public, private and parochial schools are eligible to enter the contest.

Besides local prizes, the 12 boys and girls in the state writing the best essays will be awarded an all expense-paid trip to Washington.
