Books **Country Living** THE BIG SNOW, by Jake Falstaff. Houghton Mifflin Co. Boston. Mass. \$1.50.

Jake Falstaff was the pseudonym of the beloved Cleveland reporter and columnist, that fat German newspaperman who died way before his time and who could sling a pen as few could when it came to talking about food and the imple pleasures of the good

Last year Houghton Mifflin is ued "Jacoby's Corners," a little book describing a small tesy's first experiences on a farm. It was full of the rewarding work and the delights of farm living, full of its simplicities and its rich stores in the cellar.
"The Big Snow" is another

volume of Jake Falstaff's stuff about that same young boy. This one is especially recom-mended for winter reading since it covers Christmas and the cold months. It's nostalgic, and rather sentimental: it's tenderly done, and sure to SUF up memories somewhere in your past. If you don't know Jake Falstaff, that is as good a time as any to get acquaint-

About the South

THE DAYS GROW COLD, by Eurbara Tunnell Anderson. The Macmillan Co. New York, \$2.50.

Through the eyes of a youngster, a little town in the lower South and its people come to life. There are decadent forces there-the rundown estate, once the hub of the town, and narrow lives, and rotting odors of an overripe nature-and forces for good—a thoughtful school teacher with power to inspire her pupils, and an artist with sense of social responsibility.

It's difficult to convey the sensitive, fresh quality of this story, which is a first novel. The little girl is the center of the story, and seeing the town, the Negroes, her parents, school and painting through her eyes is like get-ting a view of a familiar scene om a new angle.
Mrs. Anderson is the wife

of the dean of the school of music at the University of Louisville, and she has writ-ten articles on old houses for such magazines as House and Garden and Country Life. "The Days Grow Cold" is an unusual book and a good one.

New But Dated

IS TOMORROW HITLER'S? by H. R. Knickerbocker, Reynal & Hitchcock, New York, \$2.50,

H. R. Knickerbocker's general thesis is that "until Nazi Germany is defeated the world will never be safe for us to live in ... only by going to war can we discipline ourselves, our workingmen and our employers to defeat the Axis in the battle of produc-

It's only fair to Knickerbocker and his readers to point out that his book was written and published before Dec. 7. He wrote it to urge America to go to war. A foreign correspondent in Europe for 18 years, Knickerbocker in "Is Tomorrow Hitler's?" selects some 200 questions Americans were asking prior to the Japanese attack Pearl Harbor and gives his

personal answers. There are questions about the downfall of France, about Lindbergh, about Hitler's aims. Knickerbocker is passionately convinced of Hitler's *hreat to America, and nearly every answer is directed to that point. However, the swift march of events has already made his book seem dated,

YOUNG MAN OF CARACAS, by T. R. Ybarra, Ives Washburn, Inc., 28 W. 57th st. New York, \$3.00.

Regular readers of the New York Times know the by-line of T. R. Ybarra from his Latin American stories of re-cent years. "Young Man of Caracas" is his personal story, which Book of the Month club subscribers got as a companion piece with John Gunther's "Inside Latin America.

His mother was a Bostonian and his father a Venezuelan, so you see Tom Ybarra got off to an interesting start. The book is a warm, glowing story of his mother and father, his youth, and the conflict of two allegiances in his parents. It's full of anecdotes, simple, and upretentious ones that add up to one man's conception of his parents and the country he grew up in,

Elmer Davis contributes a lively introduction, and Ybarra's story telling, aided by the indomitable spirit of his mother, takes you on from there in a delightful book.

Uproariously Funny

THE GREAT BIG DOORSTEP, by E. P. O'Donnell, Houghton Mit-flin Co. Boston, \$2.50. Readers of E. P. O'Don-nell's first book, "Green Margins," will remember with pleasure that introduction to a new kind of American folk -the Delta people of the lower Mississippi.

In "The Great Big Door-step" O'Donnell writes of the same locale. It's an uproariously funny story of a Delta family who acquire a fine doorstep washed up by ol' man river. It was pretty pre-tentious for their makeshift cabin, but they wanted to live

up to it. Pa is one of the funniest of all, Pa who gets fat eating too much while he works for families in the region—but the kids in his home get awfully hungry. Ma knows how to whip her tongue around, but why shouldn't she, with the life she's had?

These people are a new hunk of the American scene. They're not sharecroppers and they're not burns, but they are easy-going, day-to-day-living people. They may remind you more of the Flor-ida crackers Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings writes about than any other Americans you know or have read about.

All of this is unimportant.

Just get hold of "The Big
Doorstep" and settle down for an evening of laughs.-K. B.


