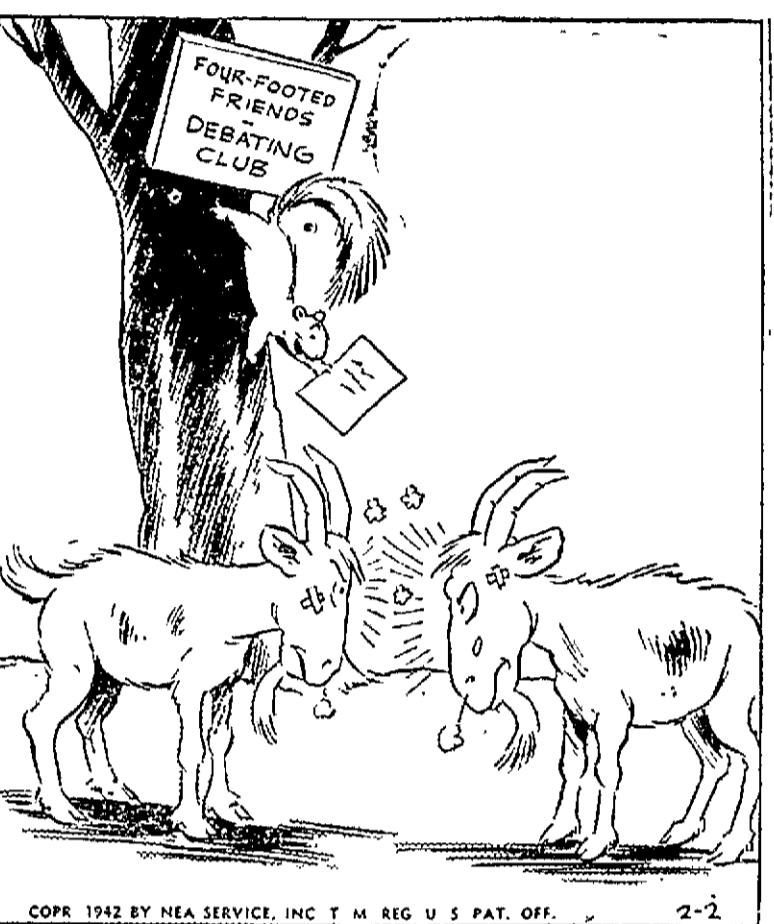

"Captains Of The Clouds" Will Be Dramatized On "Cavalcade Of America" Program At 7:30 P. M. Monday Via WEA-F

The story of fighting men who abandoned their own quarrels and came out of the northern Canadian wilderness to battle the Nazis, as told in the motion picture, "Captains of the Clouds," will be dramatized on "Cavalcade" Monday at 7:30 p. m. over WEA-F.

Jimmy Cagney, starred as Brian McLean in the film, will head the cast. Others from the picture who are to re-enact their roles are Dennis Morgan as Johnny Dutton, Alan Hale as Tim Murphy, George Tobias as Blimp Lebec, Reginald Gardiner as Scounger Harris and Squadron Leader O. Cathcart-Jones of the RCAF, technical adviser on the film, as chief flying instructor.

Charter members of the new association which will accept into membership farmers in Mercer and Auglaize-co and parts of Allen, Van Wert and Shelby-co and three Indiana counties are Ford Henschen, Ewald Kueck, Lawrence Schroeder, Clarence Holtkamp and Carl Ott, all of near New Knoxville.

Memberships are being signed by R. O. Deacon, agricultural instructor at New Knoxville and New Bremen high schools, Schroeder, Kueck and Leonard Henschen. Initial organization steps were taken Friday night at a meeting in New Knoxville.

Questions, Answers On Price Control Law

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—(UP)—Here, in question and answer form, is information about the new price control legislation. Q. When does price fixing start? A. It already has been put into effect with respect to some commodities, and may never be applied to others. The system is selective and the price administrator is authorized to place ceilings on the price of any commodity which shows signs of getting out of line with other commodities. Q. Will a license be required to do business? A. Not necessarily. The price administrator, however, may require dealers in certain commodities to operate under a license. Q. In such case, how could a license be obtained? A. By applying to the office of price administration. Q. Can the price administrator refuse a license? A. No. Q. Can he revoke a license? A. Only for a second violation of his price regulations, after a dealer has ignored a first warning, and then only on application thru the courts. Q. What happens then? A. The dealer whose license has been revoked cannot do business for 12 months. Q. Suppose the dealer is a druggist who handles a hundred different commodities and violates price regulations on only one? A. Revocation of his license would prevent him from dealing in any of them. Q. Is this the only penalty for violation? A. No. Violators are liable to criminal penalties, the maximum being a fine of \$5,000 and one year's imprisonment. In addition, any person who is charged more than the legal price for a commodity may sue the seller for three times the amount of the excess price, or \$50, whichever is higher. Q. Will farmers be required to get licenses? A. No. Fishermen also are exempt from this requirement. Q. Can the price administrator fix wages? A. No. Q. Do goods have to be sold at the price fixed? A. No. They can be sold for less but not for more than the ceiling price. Q. What can be done if the price administrator fixes an unfair price? A. Any dealer affected can file a protest within 60 days, submitting such objections and evidence as he has. Within 30 days the administrator must act on the protest, giving his reasons if he denies the protest. Q. Is there any appeal from his decision? A. Yes. The dealer may appeal within 30 days to a specially created emergency court of appeals, which would have power to set aside the price order or dismiss the complaint.
