Garbo's Absence from Broadcast Scored, Defended

WASHINGTON-(U.P) - Criticism of Greta Garbo because she did not appear on a national mile of dimes radio broadcast brought repercussions here and in Hollywood Saturday night and led to an announcement, that the incident would be brought to the attention of the U.S. film coordinator.

A charge of being uncooperative in the infantile paralysis campaign vas made against Miss Garbo by Arch Oboler, radio script writer, who went to Hollywood to prepare a program for the drive.

Oboler said he was guaranteed that Miss Garbo would make her first radio appearance on the show he was directing. However, the Hollywood victory committee, which provides talent and supervises roles for movie folk in worthwhile campaigns, denied making

any promise.
Oboler's denunciation of Miss Garbo because she did not appear on his program was made Friday Edward Arnold, president of the Screen Actors guild. declared the attack was unfair and a rank distortion of the truth.


Lamplighter Harry Has Blackout Blues KENMORE, N. Y. - (U.P.)
