Hold to Parity, Wickard Urges

Says Too High Prices **Would Hurt Farmers**

ST. LOUIS -(U.P)- Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard promised Monday he would do what he could "to keep the average prices of farm commodities from going above parity to a point that would hurt farmers, consumers, and the nation."

Farmers ask "no special privilege," Wickard told a nation-wide radio audience. "Now that we've finally reached parity, one of my strongest desires is to keep parity. I am hoping we can keep farm prices from going much above parity."

Wickard recognized the argument that farmers should be allowed several years of high prices to make up for lean years. He pointed out, however, that it "would lead to inflation and to a reaction which might destroy all we have gained during the last

His talk was considered significant in view of the controversy between Wickard and the congressional farm bloc over farm prices.

His letter said: "Responsible officials, both of this government and of the govbrought to my attention the existence of urgent need for the immediate extension to China of economic and financial assistance."


