Big League Clubs Hardest Hit by Draft Get Prize Rookies

NEW YORK (U.P.)—Military demands for stalwart young men are hitting the minor leagues but even the most dogged diamond pessimist must admit that the smaller circuits are singing their swan song in elegant style today by sending an impressive 1942 crop of rookies to the majors.

By a happy coincidence, although several big league clubs have frantically combed this freshman fodder for replacements for players lost to the armed services, the three hardest hit—the Boston Red Sox, Detroit Tigers, and Cleveland Indians—are singularly blessed as far as star newcomers are concerned.

Tigers Get Hitchcock Replacing a hitter of the Williams' calibre (406 in 1941) if he should pass his soon-scheduled physical examination, is practically impossible.

The 23-year-old Hitchcock hit 296 with the Blues last year and fielded brilliantly.

Embree Is Ace Hurler Feller's enlistment in the navy left the Indians with a huge breach in the pitching department but Cleveland has been rewarded with

two exceptionally promising recruits. One is Pitcher "Red" Embree from Wilkes-Barre of the Eastern League where he walked off with nearly all hitting honors.

Embree, 22 years old, batted 213 batters in 229 innings, led in earned run averages with 1.69, topped the won-and-lost column with a percentage of .808 on 21 victories and five defeats. He notched eight shutouts.

Warmerdam Hopes to Set New Mark in Boston Meet Saturday NEW YORK (U.P.)—Cornelius Warmerdam, long, lath school teacher from Piedmont, Calif., hopes to better his new world indoor record for the pole vault Saturday night at the Boston A. A. games, one of the three track meets scheduled this week.

Warmerdam said Monday, "My own favorite pole, delayed in transit, is certain to arrive today. With that pole I hope to do better in Boston than I did Saturday night."

Despite a borrowed pole, Cornelius stole the show Saturday night at the Millrose Games in Madison Square Garden when he floated over the bar at 15 feet 3/4 inches—the first time anyone ever had gone 15 feet indoors.

Last Showing in East Warmerdam's Boston attempt will be his second and last appearance of the eastern indoor season, he said. He will not compete in the Penn A. C. games at Philadelphia Friday, and naturally not in the New York metropolitan intercollegiate championships at the Bronx Coliseum Thursday.

The world's first and only 15-footer—outdoors or indoors—said he will leave for California after the Boston meet and, "I don't think I'll be able to return during the rest of the season—not even for the Nationals in Feb. 26."

Youth Who Killed Father Acquired

MINNEAPOLIS (U.P.)—In less than a half hour's deliberation, a jury of seven men and five women Monday acquitted James Brose, 19, of a first degree manslaughter charge for the slaying of his father, John A. Brose, 44.

Only two forms of verdict, guilty or not guilty, were received by the jury. In his final argument, Jacob Garon, defense attorney, said that Brose was prompted by the "noblest instinct of which a boy is capable—protection of his mother."

Brose shot his father, a railroad switchman, during a family quarrel Jan. 15. Defense witnesses testified that the elder Brose had been drinking and had struck his wife during a heated argument.
