Dedication of the new transmitter will go on the air at 7. First use of the station's increased night-time power of 5,-000 watts will be made tonight during this special broadcast. Complete approval of the new

transmitter construction and installation was made this week by the Federal Communications commission in Washington, D. C. This approval carried the full authority to begin broadcasting on the higher power at night, thus making WIBA a Class III-A regional station with 5,000 watts power day and night.

During tonight's dedication pro-

gram, WIBA listeners will hear a description of the new transmitter and the scene at the transmitter as the power is stepped up from 500 to 5,000 watts.

The progress of WIBA from its beginning in 1925 up to the present time, and what the future holds, will be presented as part of the broadcast.






