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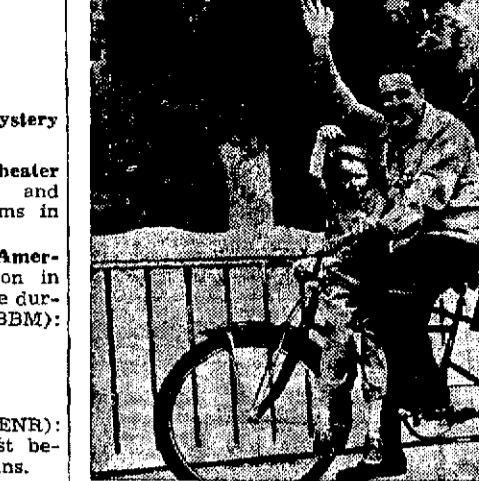
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Saving Gas and Rubber

Erv Zink, a Crafty Southpaw in 1909, Has Watch to Prove It

You could write books about the antics of old time baseball players, especially those on teams three and four decades ago.

These old timers, many of whom were present Tuesday night at the annual get-together of the Old Timers Baseball Assn. at the Hotel Loraine, still possess some sort of a reminder of the days when they were at their best, and there probably isn't anyone prouder of such a reminder than 69-year old Erv Zink.

Zink lives on his farm about three miles east of Madison on country trunk highway T, was a pretty fair country pitcher around these parts 32 years ago. He was one of the best—and also one of the funniest.

Presented by Fans The gold plated watch is Zink's proof of his abilities when he was an outstanding pitcher in Madison's Industrial League in 1909.

Frank Holloway, now a Chicago businessman, managed the Gisholt team then, and such names as "Roundy" Coughlin, Bill Deneen, Leo Tester, Percy Fess, Fred Finn, Charles Nelson, and Joe Shaughnessy, come to Zink's mind as he recalls those "good old days."

Roundy, now The Wisconsin State Journal's noted columnist, was a mighty good third baseman in those days, Zink will tell you.

Other old timers Zink recalls include Louis Fleury, Bill Hobbins, Art Hassmussen, Jack Peterson, Hank Schroeder, Herman Schichten, Percy Brausen, and a score more.

Eddie Schmitz, now a pitching opponent, and Eddie was as good a "smoking" pitcher as there were in those days.

Learned the Flip Zink, a southpaw, can be remembered by other old timers for his antics on the diamond. Many are the times that he performed a backward somersault or flip after striking out a batter, or even at a speculator's request.

The "flip", as Mrs. Zink put it, was an acrobatic stunt that the now white haired farmer mastered in the haymow of the Zink homestead barn.

An acrobatic family, named Bliss, probably was responsible for Zink's mastering the "flip" since it used the Zink haymow for brushing up on its acts.

Now, as Mrs. Zink stated, "weather beaten by 45 years of married life" Erv is planning to retire from farm labors. The couple soon will move to a bungalow "down the road."

Pitched a One-Hitter Zink would spend five days with farm work and then on Saturdays and Sundays would pitch for Madison teams either in league games or exhibition games with teams from surrounding towns, such as Sun Prairie, Deerfield, and a score more.

Oscar Ohlman was one of his catchers.

His best game was a one-hitter record a no-hitter. Some of the small town teams presented Zink with his stiffest tests, but that doesn't mean that with him as a pitcher the Gisholt team had its
