

Adventure Packed Film To Open Tuesday At The Lyric

Walter Pidgeon Is Star Of "Man Hunt"; Co-feature Is "Dance Hall" With Cesar Romero And Carole Landis

Hunted from country to country, Walter Pidgeon is the object of a relentless chase in his latest picture, "Man Hunt," an adventure film chock-full of adventure and starting Tuesday at the Lyric theatre. A dark and handsome man and a curvaceous blond are the romancers in "Dance Hall," the co-feature starring Cesar Romero and Carole Landis Monday's fare is "Tight Shoes" and Missouri Outlaw.

A furious pace for frivolity is set in the Ohio feature, "Hellzapoppin'," the screen version of the Olsen and Johnson madhouse of antics on the stage. The vaudevillians appear in the picture along with Martha Raye, Hugh Herbert, Mische Auer, Jane Frazee and Robert Paige.

Exotic Gene Tierney is the native girl of "Son of Fury," the story of Benjamin Blake starring Tyrone Power and now showing at the Quilna theatre. Cast by circumstances on the world as a soldier of fortune, Blake, or Power, sails the seven seas for adventure and romance. John Carradine, Frances Farmer, Harry Davenport, Dudley Digges and George Sanders have prominent roles.

The picture that won Joan Fontaine the gold-plated Oscar for 1942's best performance, "Suspicion," is currently at the Sigma theatre. Miss Fontaine shares the starring with Cary Grant. Sir Cedric Hardwicke and Nigel Bruce are at the top of the supporting cast. The co-feature, "Valley of the Sun," stars James Craig and Lucille Ball.

The careful planning and procedure that precedes a bombing raid, in R. A. F. style, is clearly pictured in the film, "Target For Tonight," now at the State theatre. Freddie March and Martha Foltz have the lead roles of the co-feature. "One Foot in Heaven," in which movieland opens the book and reveals the soul of a minister, American version.

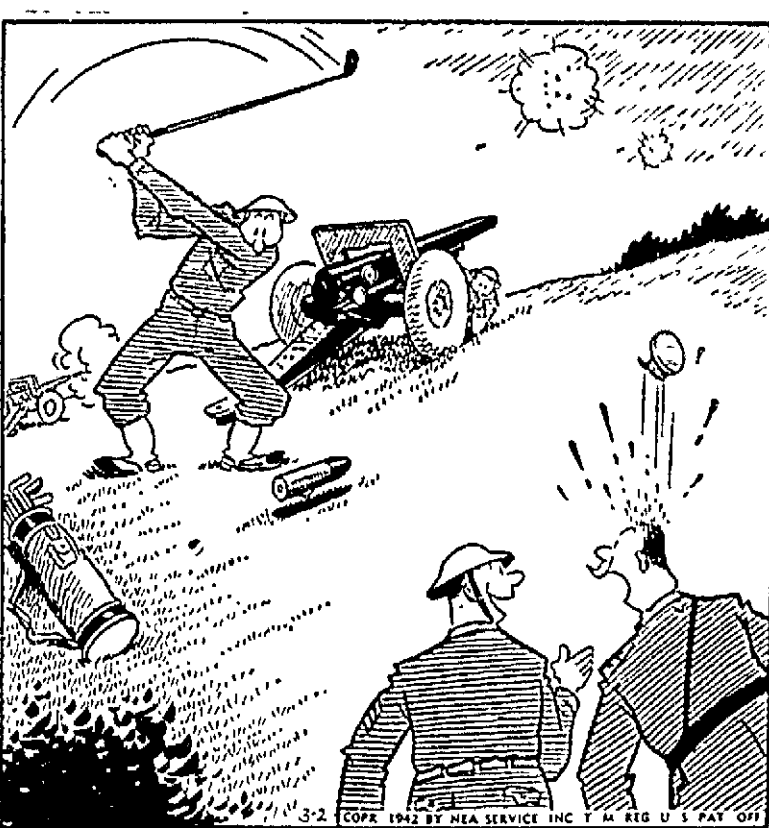

In the screen version of the book now at the Quilna theatre, Tyrone Power portrays Benjamin Blake and all the book's colorful passages come vividly to life. Old Bristol of the early 1800's is a bustling, active sea port—the Tahitian island where Tyrone meets exotic Gene Tierney is a romantic haven well off the beaten path—and the venerable ship on which Power sails is an exact replica of a boat used by Marshall in his travels.

Thrust off a 50 foot cliff, relentlessly pursued from the Bavarian Alps to the North Sea, across the Channel to England, then from London to the British countryside—that's Walter Pidgeon's fate in the new thriller, "Man Hunt." Tensely exciting, dramatic, and breath-taking, the new film which is slated to open Tuesday at the Lyric theatre offers Pidgeon and Joan Bennett (who is starred with him) the finest roles of their careers.

Based on the novel "Rogue Male" by Geoffrey Household, "Man Hunt" is preeminently an adventure story, filmed against the swift-moving panorama of recent history. As Captain Alan Thordike, world-renowned hunter and sharp-shooter, Walter Pidgeon is subjected to barbaric tortures by a cruel foe when he slips up in stalking the biggest game of all.

He becomes the quarry and leads his pursuers in a thrill-packed chase interwoven with a poignant

romance, a chase that culminates in a sensational climax. Unanimous enthusiasm for the studio's choice of Walter Pidgeon and Joan Bennett to play the leads, Pidgeon's robust, yet fascinating personality, made him the logical candidate for the role of Captain Thordike. He wanted this role and considers it his finest—and critics have agreed with him.

Miss Bennett's fans will be surprised—and more than pleased—to see their favorite actress portray the part of a London "waif," to whom love comes too late. Joan doffs her familiar sophistication without sacrificing any of her appeal. On the contrary—her haunting beauty is enhanced as the sympathetic yet worldly-wise Jerry.

The featured cast, which includes George Sanders, John Carradine and Roddy McDowall, was selected with the same exacting care as were the principals, Fritz Lang, who megaphoned "Western Union," directed "Man Hunt."

It is the case of Cesar Romero, the Casanova of Paradise Pavilion, against Carole Landis, the blonde Venus (with arms) in "Dance Hall," the new romantic comedy which starts Tuesday at the Lyric theatre.

Forest Service Hopes To Buy Ohio's Acres

WASHINGTON, March 2.—(AP)—Ultimately, perhaps in a happier future, the forest service contemplates acquisition of a large portion of the near-virgin forest lands in Ohio.

This was indicated in a report to a congressional committee during hearings on the agriculture department supply bill for fiscal '43. The land-purchase program is a slow process but the report showed that the purpose of the service was to buy up as much of the buckeye acres as possible—and preserve it in all its hard beauty for generations to come.

Leon P. Knipp, assistant chief of the service, said nearly 1,500,000 Ohio acres were available for acquisition, of which 1,176,184 are considered purchasable.

The purchase program was started many years ago and 64,155 acres in the state had been approved for purchase at a cost of \$382,383 as of June 30, 1941.

An estimated \$3,000,000 could be spent through the country during fiscal '43 barring curtailment of the program because of the war, said the report.

The acreage eyed by the forest service does not by any means include all the forest lands in Ohio. The total is 4,662,000 acres. The portion included in the purchase program is in the areas of the Hocking Valley, Little Scioto, McArthur, Muskingum and Symmes Creek forests.

OHIO TRAFFIC DEATHS SLUMP

Week-End Toll Drops To 10; Tire Rationing May Be Responsible

Ohio's week-end traffic fatalities, which frequently reach a score or more, dropped to 10 yesterday and Saturday.

State highway officials wondered if the decline fulfilled their predictions that auto and tire rationing plus reduced speeds to save trends would decrease accidents.

One victim was Edwin J. Michael, 22, of Ellet, Summit-co., killed on the last day of his employment with a trucking company. A train struck his truck in Atwater. He had planned to start work today with an Akron rubber concern.

Cleveland—James R. Kerr, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. Maurice L. Kerr, crushed by truck, and Otto Cantoni, struck by car on eve of 80th birthday.
Canton—Mrs. William H. Miller, 59, struck by car after leaving bus, and Karl Kirtler, 55, enameling plant worker, car hit pole.
Springfield—Ralph K. Owens, Jr., 27, of Columbus, machine plunged thru fence beside Route 40.
Akron—Paul Kun, 57, farmhand, as he walked along road near Peninsula.
Barnesville—William Tustin, 33, of Belmont, automobile hit utility pole.

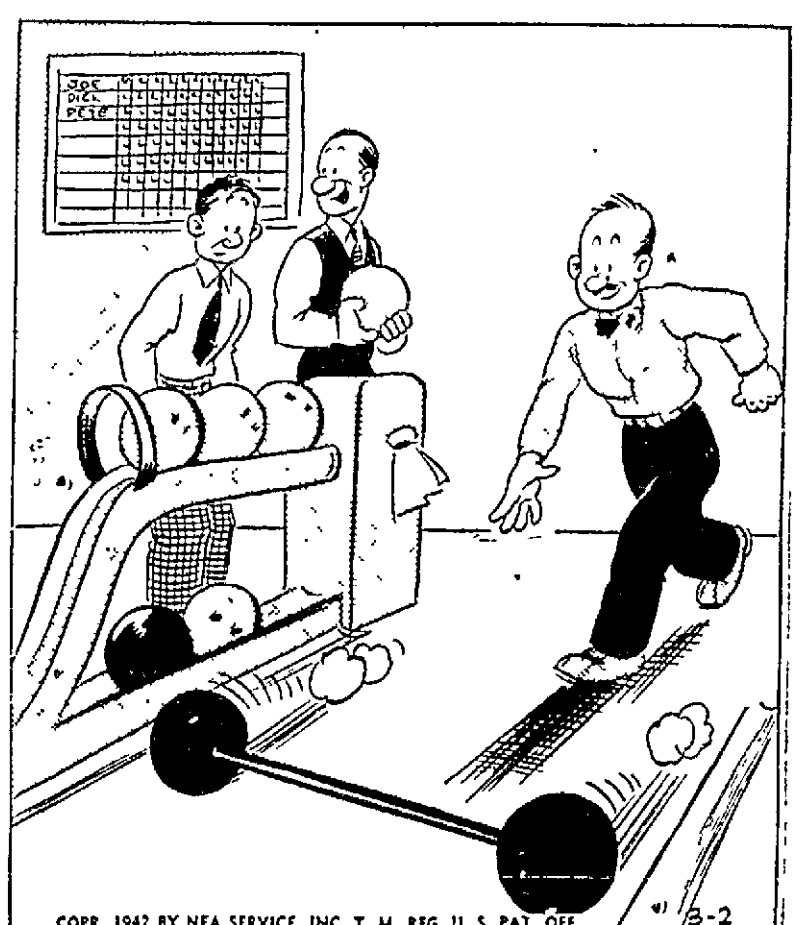
