Chemistry Pupils Stop Fires with Junk

PROVIDENCE, R. I.— (U.P.) —If fire should break out in the Hope high school chemical storeroom mouse traps would snap, metal pegs would bend on the walls, electric light bulbs would smashthe fire would be extin-

All these reactions to fire represent the working of a student-made extinguisher system. The "fire releases" are easily-melted metal pegs. On them are balanced burned-out electric light bulbs filled with carbon tetrachloride, an

effective chemical extinguisher. Under 200 degree heat, the pegs bend over and allow the bulbs to smash on the floor and release the chemical. Metal strips also are used as mouse-trap catches, which are released under extreme heat. Bulbs placed in the trap thus are




