Basketball Rules Likely to Stand

High-Scoring Proves to Be Popular

By TOMMY DEVINE CHICAGO.—(U.P.)—Basketball's "fan appeal" continues to mount with free-scoring games, and there's little likelihood of a curb being placed on offensive tactics when the National Basketball Coaches Assn. meets at New Orleans March 18-19-20.

With collegiate scoring at an all-time high in most conferences this season, some cage observers felt that coaches might recommend rule changes to help defensive play and slow down the game. Specifically, this group agreed for the return of the center jump. That sentiment however, is not reflected by the nation's top-flight basketball coaches, Norgren said.

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Johns said, cited the following persons in attempting to dissuade him from siding with the committee: Pres. C. A. 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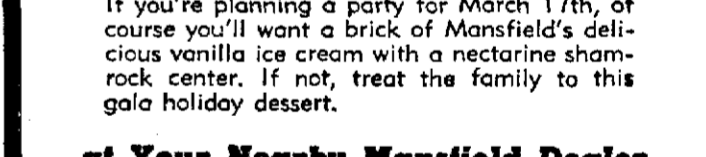
