

Kern And Herbert Melodies To Be Broadcast Highlights

Conrad Thibault, Vivian Della Chiesa Will Feature Numbers During Program Scheduled At 9 P. M. Wednesday

Beloved melodies by Jerome Kern and Victor Herbert and a sprinkling of the classics highlight the "American Melody Hour" concert over the WJZ network on Wednesday at 9 p. m., with Conrad Thibault, Vivian della Chiesa, and the mixed chorus and orchestra under direction of Dr. Frank Black.

Kern hits to be heard will be "The Night Was Made For Love" and "Twins Not So Long Ago," duet offerings by Thibault and Miss Chiesa; "Who?" and "Smoke Gets in Your Eyes" featuring the orchestra and chorus.

Herbert selections will be "When You're Away," featuring the orchestra; "Eileen," sung by Thibault and the chorus, and "Thine Alone," featuring Thibault, Miss Chiesa and the chorus.

Other selections are Schumann's "Traumerel," with Thibault, Miss Chiesa and the chorus, and Ardit's "Il Bacio," a solo by Miss Chiesa.

Mary Ann Meyer, diminutive vocal star, will salute the "Flighting 69th" of Ft. Ord, Cal., with "Somebody Nobody Loves," on "Uncle Walter's Dog House" at 8:30 p. m. Bob Strong and his orchestra present "Moonlight Cocktail" and a medley of college tunes, comprising those of Depauw, Idaho and Iowa. The quartet will contribute "Deep in the Heart of Texas."

The Wiggins Family again will demonstrate one of the innumerable ways to get started on a path that leads to retribution. The Quiz Kids will doubly honor St. Paul, Minn., during their broadcast over WJZ at 8 p. m. A youthful resident of the city, to be announced, will be guest scholar and the broadcast will originate here.

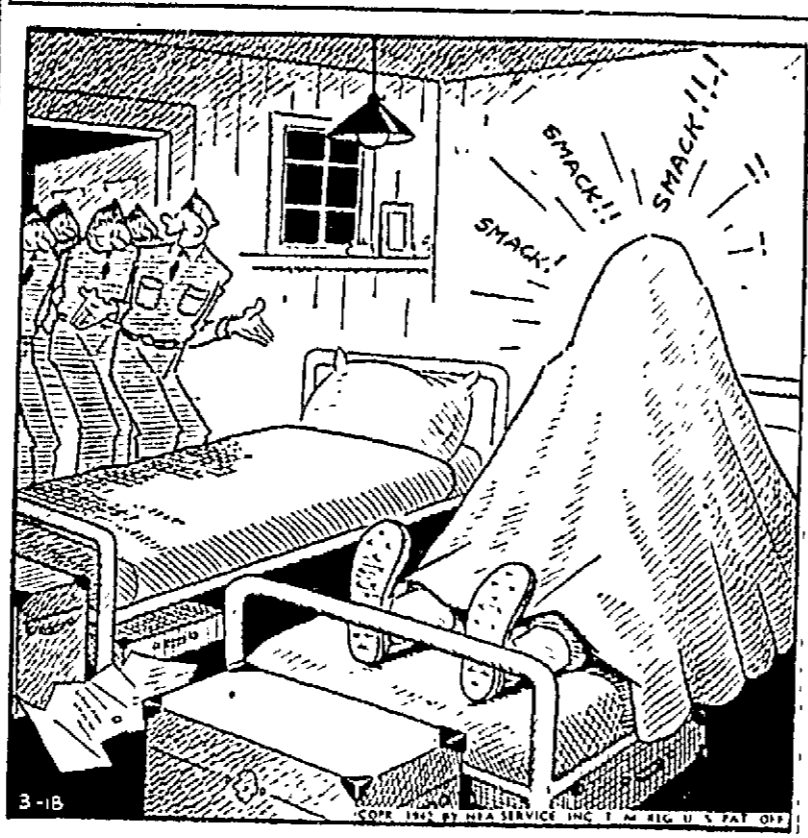
