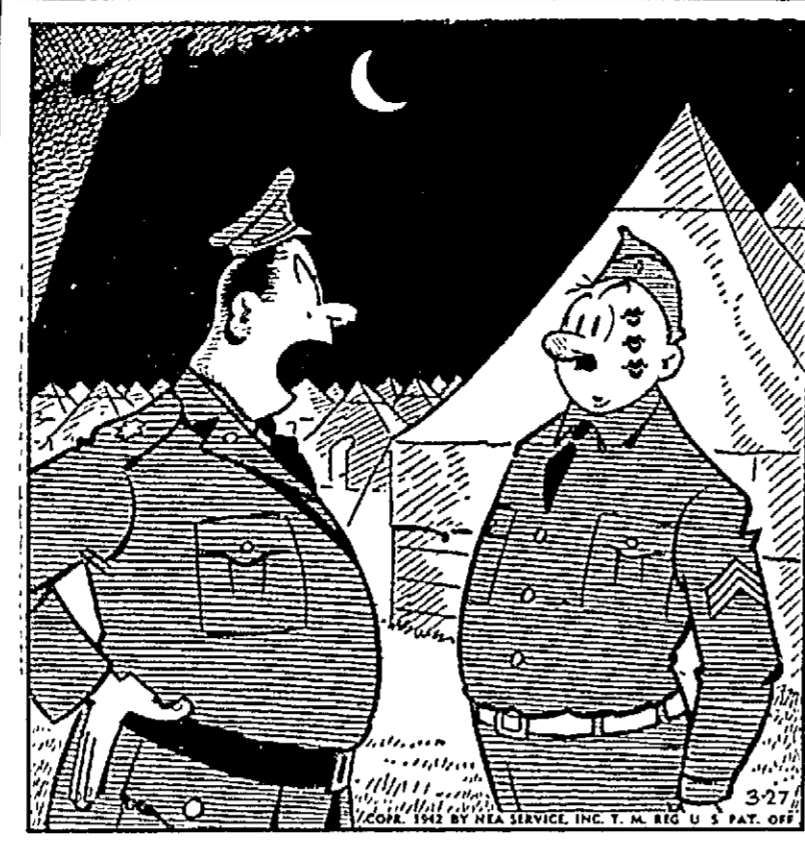

NEWSMEN'S UNIFORMS PROVIDING CHUCKLES IN WAR-TORN HAWAII

By WENDELL WEBB HONOLULU, March 27—(Wide World)—New uniforms and respectful officialdom are providing newsmen with a lot of welcome chuckles in grim Hawaii these days.

One of them was all but saluted by the two highest officers on the islands. In one instance, army officers almost had to beg to obtain entrance to naval emplacements to which accredited reporters were being escorted without question. The uniforms for newsmen are those regularly worn by army officers, but a red "C" armband—denoting correspondent—shows their civilian status.

Coincident with the induction of the men, State Selective Service headquarters at Columbus announced that the speed up in draft inductions, under which men will be sworn into the Army as soon as they have passed their physical examinations, will be in Ohio Monday.

Draft registrants who have been ordered to report to induction stations at Cleveland, Cincinnati, Columbus and Toledo will be taken into the Army as soon as the results of their physical examinations are known and will not be allowed to return to their homes as under present procedure, it was said.

In "extreme cases" where draftees need more time to settle their civilian affairs, the Army will grant furloughs.

Also the April draft call was expected to be one of the largest since the organization of selective service, state draft officers said that only four of the six induction stations in the corps area will be used next month.

The Akron station will not be used until April 20 and men scheduled to be inducted at the Huntington, W. Va., station will be cleared thru Fort Hayes.

LONDON, March 27—(INS)—A bomb was thrown at Marcel Deat, French political leader, while he was addressing a meeting in Paris last night, but it failed to explode and Deat was uninjured, the German radio quoted DNB as disclosing today in a broadcast picked up in London. The bomb "bounced off Deat's waistcoat and dropped to the floor," DNB said. According to the Nazi agency, he picked up the missile, extinguished the fuse, handed the bomb to a policeman and continued his speech.
