## State Lacks **Hay Equipment**

### Dairying May Suffer, McKay Warns

Unless the War Production board acts quickly to permit production of haying equipment, Wisconsin's expanded dairy industry will suf-fer "a considerable setback," A. G. MacKay, Whitewater, president of the Wisconsin Implement Dealers Assn., reported today.
A letter from McKay, announc-




