6,000,000 GET RATION CARDS

Another Million Ohioans Must Come Back After They Use Up Sugar

COLUMBUS, O., May 9—(AP)—The first rationing registration is the hardest, its supervisors indicated today.

Approximately 6,000,000 coupon books, allowing consumers to purchase a half pound of sugar weekly, were issued during the regular Monday-Thursday Ohio registration period and the extra day allowed by some communities yesterday, Harry T. Beckmann, state rationing administrator, estimated.

Nearly 7,000,000 of Ohio's approximately 7,500,000 registered for books, he added, but thousands were refused coupon books because they had more than six pounds of sugar on hand. Such persons generally will be eligible for books later, he said.

"The registration for the most part went off well and school teachers and other volunteer workers are to be commended for an excellent job," Beckmann said. "The registration will enable the state to swing into the possible future rationing of other items with a minimum of fuss," he added.

Altho Beckmann declined to speculate on possible rationing of other items, he pointed out that only four of the 28 coupons in "war ration book No. 1" were designated for sugar. The rest could be earmarked for other commodities as well as sugar, he explained.

The first four stamps entitle book holders to a pound of sugar for each of the following periods: May 5-16, May 17-30, May 31-June 13, June 14-27. Actual rationing started last Tuesday.

Unregistered persons may sign for books starting May 21, but must tell their local rationing boards why they were delayed. Beckmann said hundreds of rural residents had as much as a year's supply of sugar on hand. He explained that farmers who customarily bought sugar on that basis were not hoarding.

"Many other persons have considerable supplies on hand and that may account for the difference between population, registration and books issued totals," Beckmann observed. He said a force of investigators from Cleveland's office of the price administration was checking reported rationing violations by both consumers and commercial users, who registered April 28-29. Fines of \$10,000, ten years in prison or both are provided for persons convicted of giving false information in registering. One Franklin-co rationing board
