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Rolstad Hurls Barneveld to Tight 1-0 Win

Bud "Lefty" Davis and his Madison Dodgers mates suffered a heart-breaking defeat Sunday afternoon as the Sugar River Valley Baseball League opened its 14th season. The Dodgers dropped a 1-0 decision to Barneveld in a brilliant mound duel staged between Davis, a southpaw, and big Jim Rolstad, Barneveld right-hander, on the diamond atop Blue Mounds state park.

Meanwhile, Riley defeated Hollandale, 4-2, and the Madison East Side Businessmen triumphed Mt. Vernon-Perry Cubs, 8-3. Riley is after his third straight league championship this season.

The Dodgers' loss to Barneveld was a real heartbreaker. Davis allowed one hit, and that by his mound rival in the third inning, while the Dodgers coined two hits off Rolstad. Davis fanned 15 and Rolstad whiffed 11.

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Central College Meet Has 16 Events

MILWAUKEE—(U.P.)—Sixteen events, beginning with a 440 yard relay and winding up with a mile relay, will comprise the program of the 17th annual Central Collegiate Conference track contests at Marquette university, June 6, according to Athletic Director Conrad M. Jennings.

Between the two relays will be 16 events. Notre Dame, Michigan State, and Marquette, charter members of the conference, form a nucleus in the field of entries. Illinois, Wisconsin, and West Michigan also have filed entries. Because of war conditions the field was uncertain but Jennings expected several major stars to come here en route to the National Collegiate at Lincoln, Neb., June 12 and 13.

Last year Indiana compiled 42 points to win the championships. The Hoosiers were trailed by Notre Dame, Wisconsin, and Marquette in that order as 28 schools competed. To the winners go a permanent trophy and the Knute Rockne memorial traveling trophy. Individuals who win and place receive medals.
