Bela Lugosi, the screen's master of a thousand horrors, adds to new laurels to her career in cinema crime film, which is a dramatic anti-American terrorism. Joan Barclay and George Pembroke are also in the cast. Also offered is "Broadway Big Shot," starring Ralph Byrd and Virginia Vale.

Funniest spy film of the year is "My Favorite Blonde," now at the Ohio theatre with Bob Hope and Madeleine Carroll as the stars. Also reverting to slapstick occasionally the film depends primarily on the ability of Hope to produce gags with lightning rapidity to offset the serious nature of British agent Carroll's assignment.

"The Invaders," currently at the Quilna theatre, uses for its theme the victory of democratic idealism over Nazism, and has for its stars Laurence Olivier, Leslie Howard and Raymond Massey. "Trial Of Edith Cavell" Will Be Broadcast Over WJZ Tuesday Night; Red Skelton To Get Salute From Nelson Band

The "Trial of Edith Cavell," gripping story of the British nurse who became the outstanding heroine of World War I and a martyr to the cause of mercy, will be re-enacted during the "Famous Jury Trials" broadcast over WJZ on Tuesday, at 9:00 p. m.

Claudia Morgan, lovely radio and stage actress, will be heard as the plucky English girl who aroused the sympathy and admiration of a war-torn world in her trial for treason against the Imperial German Crown.

Red Skelton will get a personal salute from Ozzie Nelson and the band in the tune of "I Dood It," Jack Owen's number, which was inspired by Red's little junior and which is currently being echoed across the broadcast band. The song will be a highlight of the "Red Skelton and Company" broadcast Tuesday, at 10:30 p. m. over WJAZ.
