

Transcript Shows Arguments Made by Commissioners

(Continued from preceding page)

There is nothing personal in anything that I have said or thought. Mr. Corcoran: Mr. Rahr, from the records don't you think that the present administration of the conservation department has been carried on in pretty good shape as far as finances and accomplishments are concerned? Have you found anything in the records to the contrary? Mr. Rahr: I mean I have but I don't want—I mean I have but I don't want—I mean I have but I don't want to put it down in black and white. I just don't want to put it into a discussion. Mr. Aberg: Have you taken the pains, Mr. Rahr, to examine the financial condition and in detail go into the budget for all the departments? Mr. Rahr: Yes, and I have the budgets and the operating statements of six of the foremost other states in the union in conservation too. Mr. Aberg: You'll find we are ahead of all of them. I think you found that, didn't you? Do you know the amount of reserves we have on hand now just against the possibility of possible curtailment of income? Mr. Rahr: I know there are certain reservations there for special purposes. Mr. Aberg: We have about \$500,000 in reserve, including the \$300,000 that's in the hands of the emergency board. Mr. Dickinsen: That's including that \$300,000? Mr. Aberg: All the possible curtailments have been studied and planned for the year 1942. If you put them at \$75,000 to \$100,000 decrease in license income you are putting it at a very high figure. That's all a matter of record and the department men have all worked and planned with that in mind. There is nothing new about that and when you speak of somebody new—the thing that is so fantastic is to suggest that somebody new can come into this department and handle this job efficiently. It's a complex as you know from your own experience on this commission and to think a man can come in there as head—the director under our law is the head. He acts as the executive between meetings, carrying out the policies laid down by this commission and to even suggest that a man outside of the state is available seems somewhat juvenile; they just don't grow on trees. No one can come in here because of any value to us in less than three years. I don't give a tinker's damn. Mr. Rahr: That's a matter of opinion, Bill. Mr. Aberg: It's too complex a job. Mr. Rahr: I don't think men in business would throw a man out whose record was unassailable so far as accomplishments were concerned. You might want to change his way of doing business, yes, and curtailment is a matter we have all been looking forward to and so has the director. Because we want to curtail certainly is no reason that we can't operate in a normal and effective way. We are well staffed, sure. We have made cuts this past year, and we have cut down again this year. We can cut down plenty, but to give reasons like that as the reason or excuse for this action just won't click with the public. Mr. Catlin: We'll have to appoint somebody to act temporarily. Mr. Aberg: Yes, I have that noted. The rest is all set. What provision have you made for that? Mr. Rahr: A man that is to be the director will have to be picked by the commission and that man will probably have to be interviewed and decided on and published, and there will have to be an acting director. Mr. Aberg: Well, hasn't that been decided upon? Mr. Rahr: I would like to suggest: Mr. Patterson. Mr. Aberg: Patterson of Sturgeon Bay? Mr. Rahr: Yes, as an acting director until a functioning director can be appointed. Mr. Adams: What is his first name? Mr. Rahr: Matt Patterson. Mr. Aberg: Well, that makes it complete. Mr. Rahr: Or if anybody has another suggestion for the acting director for a two or three months' period until a man can be found. Mr. Aberg: I would suggest that the most logical thing to do is—you have a deputy director who is well informed of the program, until you choose a director which probably won't be long if these acts are any indication. Mr. Rahr: I would like to hear from others. Mr. Adams: From what I have heard about Matt Patterson—I have met the man several times, I think he could be in there as acting director if Mr. Rahr will put that in the form of a motion. Mr. Dickinsen: I think Mr. Aberg has made a suggestion there that the deputy director for the time being is on the job and knows the functioning of the situation for the time being. Mr. Rahr: It doesn't make any difference to me—it's temporary.
