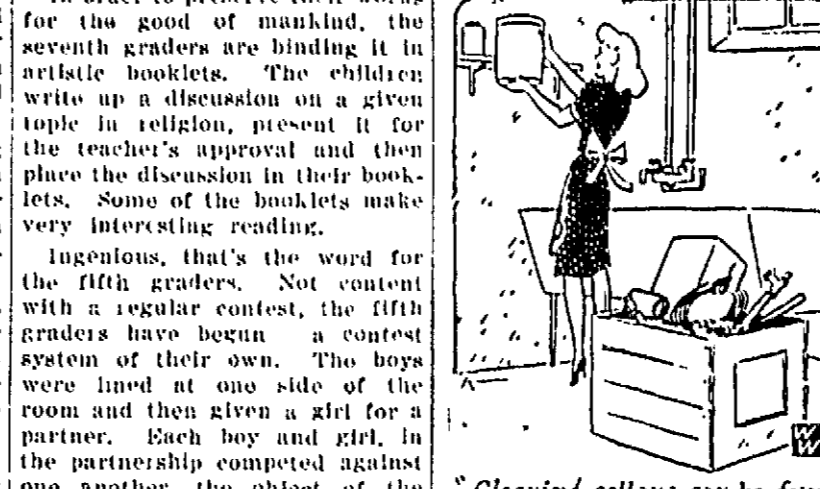
After individual scores were taken, all of the girls were added and all of the boys. The girls proved to be the victors in both contests.
