# **Leaders Favor** Freezing Wages, **Gallup** Asserts

Eagle River, Wis., **Among Communities** Investigated

By GEORGE GALLUF (Director, American Institute of Public Opinion) If the congress of the United States were composed of the nation's civic and community leaders -the heads of church councils, service clubs, boards of education, local labor councils, mayors and other civic figures-a ceiling would be placed over wages, just as it was placed May 18 over prices.

By a ratio of more than eight to two, community leaders interviewed by the Institute express the view that wage freezing is necessary at this time in addition to the price-control program. Reduced to simplest terms majority opinion is expressed in the following statement from the head of a county board of supervisors in upstate New York:

"You can't control prices without also controlling wages."

Eagle River Interviewed The views of the communityleader group of wage freezing, as well as on other national issues, have been sounded by the Institute through interviews in 239 representative communities from Maine to California. These communities include all sizes such as New York, Boston, San Francisco Worcester, Providence, Cleveland Sioux City, Topeka, Cincinnati, Dayton, Atlanta, Louisville, and Berryville, Ark.; Fallon, Nev.; Bellflower, Calif.; Mt. Pleasant, Ia.; Sterling, Conn.; Greenup, Ill.; East Brady, Pa.; Eagle River, Wis.,

Here, for example, are some of the typical statements from community leaders in various states: "The Administration has always been pro-labor. . . . Because the labor unions are in the saddle . . . Roosevelt hasn't got the nerve to do it. . . . . It won't happen as long as the Democrats are sold out to the labor unions. . . . . ## Teacher Warren D. Parker **Pictured With His Sister**



#### WARREN DOWNES PARKER 1839-1920

٠ ٠ The State Historical Society of Wisconsin is featuring one of its fine collection of portraits each week at its library on the University of Wisconsin campus. The paintings portray men and women whose personalities have had much influence on Wisconsin.

Warren Downes Parker's life work was devoted to the improvement of the public schools of Wisconsin.

Thus, this charming portrait of him as a young lad and of his sister, Marion Amine Parker (1835-75) is a fitting expression of his interest in teaching young people. The Parkers were born in Bradford, Vermont, children of County Judge J. W. D. Parker and ousins of Ella Wheeler Wilcox, he Wisconsin poet who wrote the verses which began, "Laugh and ne world laughs with you." In 1855 the Parker family moved to Janesville in Wisconsin, and War-

en finished high school there in 859. a district school in Rock county, 1859-60. Then he taught at Janes ville, at Delavan where he became principal, and at Monroe. After serving as superintendent of schools at Lake Geneva and then Janesville, he was elected president of the new State Normal he held for 18 years, 1875-89, 1894-98, during which he helped

train thousands of teachers. Parker was "for half a century a dynamic educational force in Wisconsin." His deep sincerity,
