Garden Herb Manual

HERBS, THEIR CULTURE AND USES, by Rosetta E. Clarkson. Hustrated by Tabea Hofmann. Macmillan. New York. 82.75.

"Begin with a few herbs and really get acquainted with them by growing them and by using them." This is Miss Clarkson's advice in the begin-

ning of her attractive book. It is, however, often difficult to follow as one reads through the multitudinous uses to which herbs can be put, "The Arrangement of Herbs

in the Carden" is a particularly tempting chapter, "Unusual herb plantings" is another, which threatens the usual Wisconsin alternate shrubbery of spirea, juniper, sumac and more spirea. Our artistic senses, however, may indulge themselves upon the more feasible suggestions of how to make Pot Pourri, the obvious solution for next Xmas when we will not be able to make our usual gifts of jellies and

From the more ambitious schemes Miss Clarkson steers most of us clear. She discusses practically the different uses of herbs, their cultivation, harvesting and their place in the kitchen and medicine chest. Her chapter on the culinary aspects of herbs is not particularly new but it is very basic. So too are her one hundred tabular paragraphs on 101 useful herbs, and her herb tables. In this task she is ably assisted by the charming, clear and accurate drawing of Tabea Hofmann, M. R. B.
