Aviation, American Home, and Better Homes and Gardens are new periodicals that may be borrowed from a list which already Includes Readers Digest, Life, American, Popular Science, and American Photography, Back numbers of unindexed periodicals, including American Cookery, Harpers' Bazaar, and Field and Stream, also may be borrowed for one

week at a time. The two home magazines are now especially concerned with using existing household equipment, and publish much information on salvage and economy. These are augmented by pamphlets in the reference room. One new purchase is from the Massachusetts agricultural experiment station, "Facts and Frauds in Nutri-

One of Madison's immediate problems receives the at-tention of the Museum of Modern Art, whose latest bul-letin, "Wartime Housing," was prepared with the cooperation of the national committee on the housing emergency. Library Expands 1941-42 Drama Season Closes, U. W. Lists Called 'Nothing to Brag Of' Five Plays

(United Press Drama Editor) NEW YORK-U.R)-It is a pleasure to close the books on the theatrical season of 1941-42 because it is not one that give reason to be remembered fondly. The arbitrary closing time was midnight, May 31; we are now in the season of 1942-43, but there won't be many new productions until late summer or early fall.

The statistics show that from June 1, 1941, to June 1, 1942, there were 75 so-called Broadway productions, excluding the offerings of experimental groups, a few Gilbert and Sullivan revivals, and miscellaneous items such as three vau-

deville units. Surprisingly, this is four more productions than were offered in the 1940-41 season. but that isn't anything to brag about because there were more offerings which closed in less

than a week.
Nine Smash Hits

Breaking down the total figure we find that there were 56 new plays produced, eight musical comedies, one revue, and 11 revivals in 1940-41. In the 1939-40 season the total num-ber of productions was 84, it was 84 also in 1938-39, and 104 in 1937-38.

Of the 75 productions, nine can be said to have been "smash hits," although one of these, the Katharine Cornell revival of "Candida" which has been given a series of special performances, makes and navy relief organizations. There are seven, possibly eight, other productions which can be said to have made money on their Broadway showings alone. There are two or three others which have gotten out of the red solely because of their sale of the films, Of the hits, four were musi-

cals and three were revivals

—"Candida," "Porgy and
Bess," and "Macbeth."

Only Two "Gold Mines"

The outright, dismal failures, ranging from plays which cost a few thousand dollars to musicals which were well over the \$100,000 mark, thus were 55 or 56. The number of these which did not survive a week's run was pathetic.

This season just past was the one which saw both the Critics' Circle and the Pulitzer play committee unable to designate an American play worthy of being dubbed the sea-son's "best." The Critics did recognize Noel Coward's "Blithe Spirit" as the best new play by a foreign author and it fully deserved that designation.

Eddie Cantor's "Banjo Eyes" must be listed as a failure because, although it played to good grosses, the comedian was forced to close it prematurely when he had to go to a

Two gold mines which the season produced were "Junior Miss" and "Angel Street." Both of them have played to capacity or near capacity since opening and there are indications that they will run well into next season, with road companies hitting the high spots to scoop up profits from the rest of the country.

Pessimism vs. Optimism The two biggest surprises were the successes of "Angel Street" and the revival of George Gershwin's "Porgy and Bess." The latter was a financial failure when first produced several years ago but the large theater housing this revival by Cheryl Crawford scarcely has had an empty seat since it bowed in during Jan-

Some showman think that this summer will be a good one for Broadway because of the car-tire-gas situation which is bound to keep a lot of people in the city who otherwise would be traveling far and wide patronizing the rural stock companies. Others take a most pessimistic view and claim that nothing will do any good until it is obvious that we are well on the way to winning the war.
