

"Mayor Of 44th Street" To Open Wednesday As Sigma Hit

Entertaining Comedy Is Showing Now At Quilna; "Ball Of Fire" At State, "Juke Girl" At Ohio

A gangland melodrama played to the stunning climax amid the shifting lights and shadows of Broadway and pleasantly spiced with the sweet harmonies of Freddy Martin's band, is "The Mayor of 44th Street," which commences Wednesday at the Sigma theatre. George Murphy and Ann Shirley are the stars of the film. Also showing is "Pacific Rendezvous," starring Lee Bowman and Jean Rogers. Showing for the final times Monday are "Saboteur" and "Scattergood Rides High."

"The Wife Takes a Flyer," with Joan Bennett and Franchot Tone, is now at the Quilna theatre. It is said to be a laugh-filled fable of an RAF man who bails out over enemy territory, into the arms of the loveliest saboteur in the countryside. Also showing is "Tramp, Tramp, Tramp."

The complications that arise when a night club singer takes refuge from the police by moving in with eight professors working on a new encyclopedia, underlie the hilarious fun of "Ball of Fire," starring Gary Cooper and Barbara Stanwyck, and now at the State theatre. Joel McCrea and Veronica Lake are the stars of co-feature, "Sullivan's Travels."

The amazing drama in a Welsh mining district is authentically captured in "How Green Was My Valley," now at the Lyric theatre. Among the top performers in its cast are Walter Pidgeon, Maureen O'Hara, Donald Crisp, Roddy McDowall, John Loder, Barry Fitzgerald and Patric Knowles. Stars of the second attraction, "Sweetheart of the Campus," are Ruby Keeler, Harriett Hilliard and Ozzie Nelson.

An instrument that has almost become an institution lends its name to the title of the Ohio film, "Juke Girl," starring Ann Sheridan and Ronald Reagan in a story of a juke joint dancer and her sweetheart. Meanwhile the decks are being cleared for the Friday attraction, "Clyde McCoy and his Sugar Blues orchestra," which will present four shows on that day.

A musician writing a score for motion pictures finds himself rather in the role of the perpetual student," states Musical Director Alfred Newman, the creator of the score for the Darryl F. Zanuck production of "How Green Was My Valley," the film now playing at the Lyric theatre. "In the case of my new picture, 'How Green Was My Valley,' my particular field of new study was Welsh music. OFFICERS ARE SELECTED AT BUCKEYE BOYS' STATE

DELAWARE, O., June 16—(AP)—Buckeye Boys' State settled down today to a week under a government of its own choosing. Donald Bowers, 16-year-old Akron high school senior, was elected "governor" of the encampment, sponsored yearly by the American Legion to give youth of Ohio practical lessons in democratic government. Bowers defeated Dean Lauritzen of Canton, 355 to 320 in the election yesterday.

Other officers chosen were John Gibbs of Middletown, lieutenant governor; Harry Creveling of Painesville, auditor; Gordon Brickner of Portsmouth, treasurer, and Philip McFarland of Warren, attorney general.

JAMES CAGNEY AHEAD OF GABLE AS WAGE-EARNER

PHILADELPHIA, June 16—(UP)—James Cagney, movie actor, edged out Clark Gable as second largest wage earner in 1941, with \$362,500, the Securities and Exchange Commission revealed today in releasing additional reports of corporations.

Louis B. Mayer, managing director of Loew's, Inc., continued to hold first place for the fourth consecutive year with \$704,425, nearly twice the salary Warner Brothers paid Cagney.

22 ALIENS ARE SEIZED BY FBI IN OHIO CITIES

CLEVELAND, June 16—(INS)—Capture of 22 enemy aliens in seven Ohio cities was disclosed today by the Federal Bureau of Investigation which revealed a quantity of arms and ammunition was confiscated in the simultaneous raids.

Jose C. Parks, acting director in charge of the Cleveland FBI office, said the haul of aliens, all Italians, was the largest single roundup in this area since the war began.

Along with the 22 men picked up in Lorain, Cleveland, Alliance, Akron, Youngstown, Canton and East Canton, were two 12-gauge shotguns, three rifles, a revolver, blackjack, four cameras, a short-wave radio, two military uniforms, more than 500 rifle shells and almost 300 shotgun shells.

The men, whose capture brought the total number seized here to 91, were being held for hearings before the Alien Enemy Hearing board. Of the 91, 16 were German, 40 Italian, and five Japanese.

It is a patriotic duty to hold them, said Mrs. Don A. Detrick, executive secretary of the Ohio Fair Managers' Assn., since they will aid morale and stimulate interest in the food production program.

60 PER CENT OF TRUCKS BREAK FEDERAL RULES

CLEVELAND, June 16—(AP)—Ohio truck operators who came here today to study rules promulgated by the Office of Defense Transportation, learned that 60 per cent of the trucks hauling freight into and out of the city were violating regulations.

C. R. Allen of Cleveland, regional manager for ODT and former general manager of the Bolin Driveway Co., said a similar percentage of violations was being made by local delivery services in the Cleveland metropolitan area.

Allen said that for the time being his office would depend on the activities of "the honest, patriotic truckers who want to win this war," and the willingness of householders to report truck operations, particularly in local deliveries, that violate regulations.

The rules most flagrantly violated are: one stipulating that a truck delivering and picking up goods over a circuitous route must not exceed by 10 per cent the crew's flight mileage for a round trip between starting point and return; and secondly, the one forbidding any special deliveries except to hospitals or the armed forces, or to places that may need emergency supplies for the protection of life and property.

The second regulation also prohibits any delivery truck from calling at the same place more than once a day, and stipulates that all local delivery trucks must cut 25 per cent from their mileage as compared with the same mileage of 1941.
