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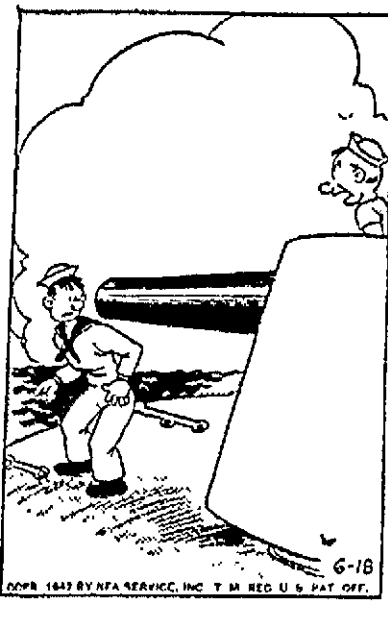

Clyde McCoy And Band Will Be On Ohio's Stage Friday

Famous Sugar Blues Orchestra To Do Four Shows; McLaglen And O'Brien Co-Star In Film "Power Town"

Clyde McCoy, hot-lipped rival of Gabriel, brings his Sugar Blues orchestra to the Ohio theatre stage Friday for a session of music designed to thrill the souls of melody-loving Americans. Four complete shows are scheduled for the day, the first commencing at 12:30 p. m. On the screen is "Powder Town," starring Victor McLaglen and Edmond O'Brien.

Pat O'Brien, Brian Donlevy and Janet Blair are the stars of "Two Yanks in Trinidad," which commences with the Quilna Friday preview showing. Also on that program will be "Not A Ladies' Man," starring Paul Kelly and Fay Wray, showing for the last times Friday.

"The Wife Takes a Flyer," starring Sidney Toler in the fat-tone, and "Tramp, Tramp, Tramp," The combining of raw underworld melodrama with "sweet swing" as the major entertainment elements of a film is accomplished in "The Mayor of 44th Street," with George Murphy and Anne Shirley co-starring with Freddy Martin's band, now at the Sigma theatre.

The marquee also lists "Pacific Rendezvous," starring Lee Bowman and Jean Rogers.

Charlie Chan traps a beautiful murderer's murderer in the gay tropical background in his latest picture, "Charlie Chan in Rio," starring Sidney Toler in the famous roles, and commencing Friday at the Lyric theatre.

On Tuesday Mrs. Albert Warnock and Mrs. Alphonse Ellerbrock were in Lima.

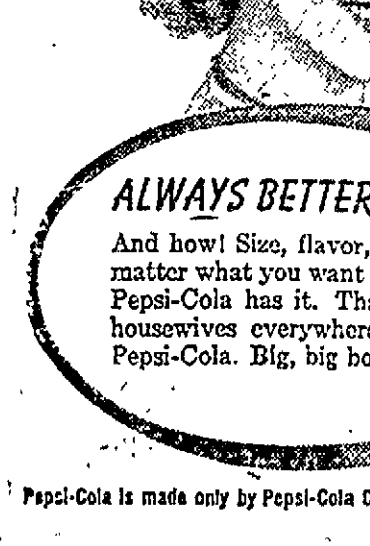
