

IMPORTANCE OF SALVAGE DRIVE TOLD BY HEAD

Chairman Dan Haselmire Calls For Cooperation In Scrap Effort Here

"In the coming months, more and more planes, tanks and guns will roll off the assembly lines. This means a heavy drain on all sources of materials. From salvage can be obtained this vital war material."

With this statement, F. Dan Haselmire, chairman of the salvage committee of the Allen-Civilian Defense Council, stressed the importance of Lima and Allen-C's "Salvage For Victory" campaign which opens Monday.

"Scrap metal," Haselmire said, "makes implements of war, steel, brass, copper, lead and other metals for guns, planes, tanks and ships, which we need for victory."

"Old rubber makes new rubber for our motorized forces, planes, tanks and battleships and for essential civilian needs. We have been cut off from sources of 98 per cent of our rubber. Conservation and more conservation will be needed to alleviate this condition."

"Waste paper makes new paper board cartons in which to ship shells, machine parts, clothing and food for America's fighting men at home and overseas. The average family of four should be able to save 50 pounds of waste paper each month. This would mean a total of 14 billion pounds a year."

"Old rags make needed materials for emergency buildings, wiping rags for industries and re-worked textiles."

Extensive plans have been made for the "Salvage For Victory" campaign in which city trucks will make their rounds of the city's six wards.

The pick-up trucks will visit the First ward Monday, Second ward Tuesday, Third ward Wednesday, Fourth ward Thursday, Fifth ward Friday, and Sixth ward Saturday.

Residents are urged to have their scrap materials piled at the curb or at the entrance of the alley when the trucks visit their wards.

The city's annual clean-up campaign will be held in conjunction with the scrap drive. Refuse should be piled in a separate heap as a separate truck will pick up rubbish. Ashes and garbage will not be taken in the drive.

POWER COMPANY RIGHT OF WAY HEARING FIXED

Necessity for construction of an electric power line leading to the Ohio Gun Plant, south of Lima on the old Adgate farm, was scheduled to be shown Friday afternoon in Allen-C probate court.

The procedure, at which a lieutenant in the Army Ordnance department will be the chief witness, will be preliminary to a hearing in the suit in appropriation brought by the Ohio Power Co. against Hoegner and Cantieny, Inc., of Lima.

The case will be heard before Judge Raymond P. Smith. The court is asked to take steps to be taken to enable the plaintiff to appropriate certain land as provided by law. The hearing was viewed as a preliminary to condemnation proceedings against a few property owners objecting to disposal of their land for the project.

In a second suit filed Thursday afternoon by The Ohio Power, five defendants are named. They include C. L. V. Stoner, William B. Stoner, Cora Stoner, John A. Stoner and I. G. Stoner. The power company seeks to cross two tracts of land containing 11.56 and 73.1 acres, the properties of the defendants. As in the Hoegner and Cantieny suit, an 80-foot right-of-way is being sought.

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STABILIZATION OF STEEL MILL WAGES IS SEEN

Labor Board's Decision May Serve As Basis, Officials Predict

WASHINGTON, June 19 (INS)—Government officials predicted today that the War Labor Board's decision on the "Little Steel" dispute will serve as the basis for the stabilization of wages in the steel industry.

It was pointed out that the government is making rapid progress toward wage stabilization in all big mass production war industries and within a few weeks expects to stabilize wages in ordnance, machine tools and aircraft industries as well as in steel.

A fact-finding panel on the "Little Steel" dispute, which has been pending since February, will make its report to the WLB next Thursday and a public hearing will be held four days later.

The dispute, involving employees of the Republic Steel Corp., the Bethlehem Steel Corp., Inland Steel Co., and the Youngstown Sheet and Tube Co., arose when the CIO's United Steel Workers demanded a \$1 a day wage increase and a union shop.

It is reported that the fact-finding panel has drawn up a report which shows the way to a wage increase in the "Little Steel" case. In the decision on the Ranger Aircraft dispute, the WLB made it clear that wage stabilization "cannot be accomplished by freezing existing rates."

Officials believed that WLB will order a "maintenance of union membership" clause inserted into the contract between the steel companies and the USW to settle the union shop issue. The board no longer considers the union shop question a serious problem and has agreed that the "maintenance of membership" clause is the solution to union shop disputes.

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Victory Held Major Task By Union Leader

"Winning the war is the most important task facing American workers today," Jack Thompson, UAWA-CIO Regional director and international executive board member told members of the Superior Coach local Thursday night.

Thompson, who has just returned from his international board meeting, is making a tour of his territory to report directly to the United Auto Workers' membership the war production policies of the international union.

"Production and more production must be the slogan of every UAWA-CIO member. This is our war and I hate to predict what would happen to our union movement if we fail to win. 'It's a pleasant job for me to report to you that the UAWA to a man has responded to the appeal of our President by supporting in every detail the war effort,' he stated.

In a discussion regarding contractual relations Thompson declared that, "we don't propose to relinquish our gains made for the American workers. In fact, we expect management to cooperate in the war effort by providing the men with decent wages and decent working conditions."

When asked by the members if overtime bonuses were to be eliminated Thompson said, "We are willing to make sacrifices in proportion to the sacrifices made by management. When plants are put

on a 24-hour, three-shift basis then the UAWA will waive for the duration of the war the double time provisions for holidays and Sundays. We will expect however time and one-half provisions after 40 hours in accordance with the laws and double time after 48 hours.

"We're out to win the war and we're out to maintain democracy in America. Let this be a warning to management that we won't stand for shenanigans on their part while we're doing all we can to win this war," he concluded.
