

PRINCETON, N. J.—The politi-cal spat between Wendell Willkie and Thomas E. Dewey is being watched by political observers as a preliminary round for the 1944 presidential fight. The disagreement between the

two men came to a head this week when, with Dewey a leading Republican candidate for governor of new York, Willkie pointedly sug-gested that the New York GOP should not overlook Rep. James Wadsworth as a gubernatorial candidate.

The Willkie-Dewey conlucts has broad implications for the Republican party throughout the nation. The chief question is whether the rank and file of GOP voters would side with Willkie or with Dewey if these two most popular men in the party should come to a showdown over the 1944 presidential nomi-
