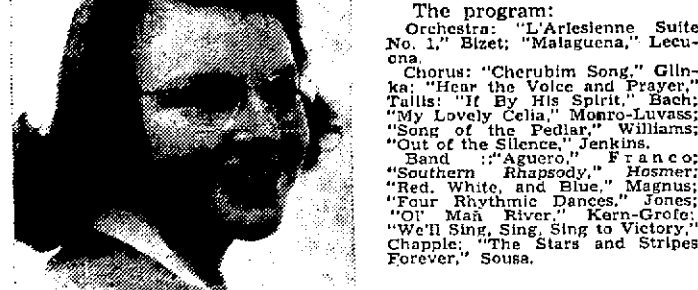


Music Clinic Pupils To Present Program

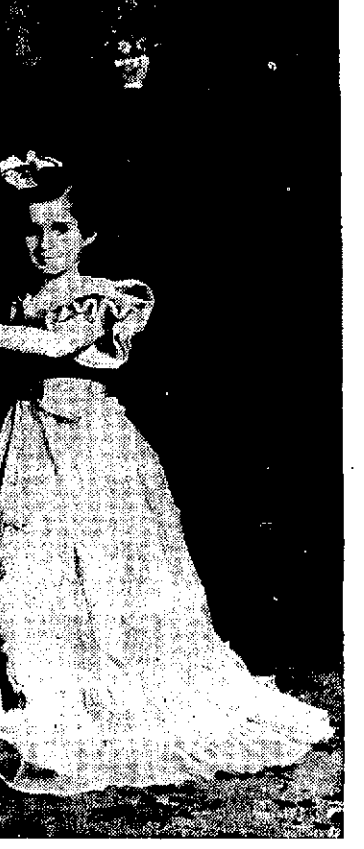

26 to Talk Over Radio Before Rally

Twenty-six speakers prominent in Scandinavian church, educational and labor circles, will take part in a series of eight broadcasts over WIBA and WHA and a hook-up of 24 Wisconsin radio stations beginning Monday and concluding Saturday, publicizing the Scandinavian public rally and broadcast to be held in Madison next Sunday.

The broadcasts will be from 5:45 to 6 p. m. daily, Monday through Saturday, with additional periods scheduled at 7 to 7:15 p. m. Monday and 1:15 to 1:30 p. m. Saturday.

The rally itself, to be held at 2 p. m. next Sunday at Breese Stevens field, will be short-waved to the Scandinavian countries and will consist of a message by four Madison war workers of Norwegian and Swedish birth.

Retailers to Apply for Extra Sugar at Ration Office

Retailers of sugar not allowed enough to meet current needs may apply to the Dane county rationing office, 10 S. Webster st., for an increase in their inventory, the rationing board said Saturday.

Authorities also announced a change in procedure for institutional and industrial users. This group will make one application before July 5 for July and August allotments and may obtain application blanks from county headquarters or deputy boards in 21 cities, villages and townships.

When completed, the application blank should be sent or delivered to Madison headquarters. Under a new federal ruling churches and lodges must serve four meals a week regularly in order to be eligible to apply as an institution. Rules governing groups serving occasional meals will be announced later, the board said.
