Outstanding Players In Quilna Film

Pat O'Brien and Brian Donlevy yesterday introduced a marathon free-for-all to Quilna theatre audiences. In Columbia's hectic, hilarious new fun-and-festive, "Two Yanks in Trinidad," the stellar pair wage war upon each other with delightful disregard for consequences, interrupting their fraternal homicide only long enough for them to join forces with each other in order to play a spectacular part in a bigger war.

Lovely Jar T Blair, comparative newcomer to the screen, whose roles become increasingly better shares acting honors with the "two Yanks," and major supporting players include Donald MacBride, Roger Clark and John Emery. Gregory Rattoff, himself a comedian of no mean ability, directed the new film, successfully interlarding its comedy sequences with suspenseful moments of edge-of-the-seat excitement.

The "Two Yanks" of the title are Manhattan mobsters who join the Army. In order to escape a "rub-out," Brian, in order to guarantee it! Hit Western Flashing On Lyric Screen

Thrills, action, romance and comedy comprise the current screen fare for western fans at the Lyric theatre, where "The Desert Trail," starring John Wayne, opened last night for a two-day run.

"The Desert Trail" is probably the most amusing of the John Wayne series to date. It is the story of feminine complications encountered in the spirited rivalry between a debonaire gambler and a handsome rodeo star. Much comedy is occasioned by their various encounters and their philandering affairs.

John Wayne, as the rodeo star, presents one of his finest performances, while Eddy Chandler gives a hilarious depiction of the smooth-talking gambler. Appearing opposite Wayne in the leading feminine role is pretty, blonde Mary Kornman, who is a more than usually personable western heroine. Another important feminine role is skillfully portrayed by dark-eyed Carmen Lacey.

Other members of the cast who deserve commendation for fine performances are Paul Fix, Al Ferguson, Lafe McKee and Henry Hall.

Cullen Lewis, a new-comer to the ranks of screen directors, presents in his initial effort a smooth tempo which should elevate him to top honors in the western field. The fast-moving and amusing story was the work of Lindsay Parsons.
