

"True Or False" Program To Be Continued Thru Summer

"Search For Freedom" Will Be Premiere Broadcast Of Inter-American University Of The Air

Dr. Harry Hagen bade his listeners farewell for the summer on his "True or False" program from Bolling Field, Washington, D. C. last Monday night.

The following day, however, his sponsor asked him to cancel his vacation and stay on the air thruout the summer months.

Effective Monday night, the program will be heard on 33 stations of the Blue network at 8:30 p. m. (EWT). The broadcast originates this week in New York.

"The Search For Freedom," a drama-packed cavalcade of man's struggle for liberty, has been selected as the premiere broadcast of the NBC Inter-American "University of the Air," Monday at 10:30 p. m. EWT, on the NBC-Red network.

Based on the Atlantic charter, "The Search For Freedom" is the first of 13 consecutive broadcasts in a series titled, "Lands of the Free," the summer series of the radio university.

Alfred Lunt, rarely heard in radio and as rarely appearing without his wife, Lynn Fontaine, makes his first sponsored broadcast on "Cavalcade of America" Monday as Alexander Hamilton in "The Gentleman from the Islands," (NBC-Red, 8 p. m. EWT). Miss Fontaine's own first sponsored broadcast was on "Cavalcade of America" May 4, as Anne Royall, first Washington newspaper woman, in "The Printer Was a Lady."

Murder And Mystery Films Featured On Lyric Screen

Sergeant York Is At Ohio With Double Programs Current At Quilna, Sigma And State

Murder in a long deserted theatre, and a mysterious shot fired out of the darkness of the wing, these furnish the countless thrills and laugh situations in the newest and most hilarious screen comedy, made by Olsen and Johnson, "All Over Town," which comes to the Lyric theatre Tuesday.
