

Tommy Riggs Will Sub For Burns And Allen For Summer

Program Also Shifted To Columbia Circuit; Orchestra Medley To Highlight Meredith Wilson's Spot

The new Tommy Riggs show, which takes over the Burns and Allen assignment for the summer months, will be heard over WABC from 9 to 9:30 p. m. on Tuesday.

Tommy Riggs' half hour of fun and music with his invisible partner, Betty Lou, begins Tuesday, July 7. In the meantime, the pair will visit the last two Burns and Allen programs, June 23 and 30, both of which will be heard over NBC.

Highlights of Meredith Wilson's program Tuesday, July 7, 9:30 p. m. EWT, NBC-Red, will be an orchestra medley showing the way Americans have said "I Love You" in the past century and a half. The medley begins with 18th Century tunes, proceeds thru the past hundred years to the Jazz Age of the last post-war period, and concludes with "Thirty-two Bars of I Love You," an original composition by the composer-conductor.

The usual "lost music" offered by Wilson on his new show will be featured next Tuesday by an old folk tune, "Love Is Just a Cheat." Irving Caesar has revived the song. As for Wilson's memoirs of his boyhood years, he has nicknamed "Cannonball," a tussle about a railroad train. He heard it at a vaudeville show when he was eight years old. As usual, Wilson himself has reconstructed the words and music for a duet by Connie Haines and Bob Carroll. John Nesbitt will appear with a contemporary piece on some phase of Americana.

VOICE OF THE PEOPLE

Dear Sir: Below you will find a letter which I have written and which if you would be so kind it would make me very happy if you printed it in your Voice of The People column.

My letter is as follows: America, our country, is now fighting a war against a terrible foe. During the last war and in the years following that war American people began to look upon many of the old formalities during and after that war as slightly nonchalant toward morals, and at the same time our crime record mounted so high that it will forever remain a very black mark upon the history of America during that period. So even foreign countries looked upon this country as very unbecoming and unexcusable.

America, just because there is war, cannot afford a repetition of its late period of crime and general loose morals. In fact America must be more cautious in time of war than in time of peace, because in time of war a nation must not be frivolous toward the morals of its people and toward crime in general.

America must again go back to that period when its people were more serious minded and more moral.

In time of war more so than in time of peace we must not tolerate immorality and crime in general.

Nipponese spies lurk in every nook and cranny in the current Quilna film, "Secret Agent of Japan," with Preston Foster and Lynn Bari furnishing the romance. In appropriate contrast is the pleasant comedy air of "The Mad Martindales," with Jane Withers, Alan Mowbray and a Marjorie Weaver in the leading roles.

A show based on the military exploits of the greatest individual hero of modern warfare, "Sergeant York," is now at the Ohio theatre. Cary Cooper plays the title role, with Joan Leslie and Walter Brennan in the cast of the life of the Kentucky frontiersman who fought so valiantly in France.

An array of musical and dramatic talent including Jimmy Dorsey, his orchestra, Left Erickson, William Holden, Eddie Bracken, Betty Hutton and Dorothy Lamour, appear in "The Fleet's In," currently showing at the State theatre. In contrast with the prison scenes are many colorful sets in New York, Europe and South America. A New Year's Eve celebration in New York in 1923 plays an important part in the picture, as well as a debutante party at a prominent hotel for which New York's 400 is famous.

Miss Hopkins appears in what might be called a cavalcade of styles, which form an interesting contrast between the evening and afternoon dresses of 1923 with the present day fashions.

Heliotrope is the flower worn by the hero in the picture and it plays an important part in the plot. This is a sweet scented lavender flower that is used as a symbol of good luck. Its perfume, while delicate, is unmistakable, a quality that a lawbreaker should avoid.

Other members of the cast include Gloria Holden, Philip Reed, Harold Huber, Sharon Douglas, Douglass Dumbrille and Bill Henry.

"All Over Town" is now at the Lyric theatre, young and old, solemn and frivolous, grave and giddy, have been re-hashing the antics of Olsen and Johnson, which is probably one of the funniest comedies ever made. It's been "all over town" and back again!

Celina Cream Plant Sold On Court's Order

CELINA, July 7—Judge Marion B. Owen, Champaign-co, who by assignment has heard the foreclosure action of L. M. Otis, against The Producers Creamery and Cold Storage Co., Monday, confirmed sale of the Celina and Greenville plants to Fred C. Fieher and other Celina interests, for \$300,100.

The action when originally filed on November 17, 1941, asked the court for appointment of a receiver and since that date the plants have been operated by Reed Shafer, receiver. On June 4, Judge Owen ordered the premises sold as of the close of business on June 30, 1942. Sealed bids were received up to noon Monday and shortly after 12:00 the Fisher bid, the only one submitted, was opened.

Main products of the two plants, which daily handle approximately 300,000 gallons of milk, is powdered milk, much of which is sold on government contract. The plant will continue to operate under the present management of H. C. Bowman and Reed Shafer, according to a statement by Fisher late Monday.

KENTON YOUTH DIES AS TRUCK TIRE BLOWS OUT

It was reported "resting comfortably" in McKittrick hospital here Monday evening.

Timmons was driving the truck. Sheriff Fred Jones of Wyandot-co believes they were driving at a high rate of speed when the truck left the road and a tire blew out as it skidded along the gravelled berm. The body of Timmons was removed to the Schindewolf funeral home in Kenton, pending completion of arrangements.
