Union Displays Persian Rugs

Rare Examples Included in Collection

Persian rugs from the Jollos collection are on view in the main gallery of the Wisconsin Union until July 17. The exhibition has been arranged by the Union gallery commit-tee of which Ralph Rosenblum is in charge.

The collection, part of which has been in the Jollos family for nearly 300 years, shows many rare examples of the disappearing art of rug weaving, and includes rugs, saddle bags, and bridal trappings, from Belouchistan, Korassan, Kazack, Hamaden, Bokhara, Sarabande, Soumack, and

One of the largest rugs on view is a Korassan, nearly 300 years old, and valued at \$6,700. The rug was given to the grandfather of the late Dr. Victor Jollos by a Persian diplomat in return for serv-

Families Weave Many of the other rugs were collected in Egypt by Dr. Jollos where he and his family lived before coming to this According to the accompany-

ing description for the exhibition, these rugs are woven by certain families who take pride in their artistry and hand down the ancient patterns in chants, to be sung as the weaver works, since the illiterate families cannot write down directions.

Each province has its own patterns, and the vegetable dyes used in the rugs usually are the secret formulas of families. Occasional sudden shifts in color, noticeable in some of the rugs, are often attributed to the death of the original dye maker, or inability to get all the ingredients of the formula after the rug has been started.

A large "Sidi Kazack" on view is said to be one of two rugs now in existence, the other belonging to the king of Poland. The Kasacks, or Cossacks, are a wild, nomadic tribe living along the Don

rubs is a Bokhara, from the area renowned for its rug-weaving. Bokhara rugs are extremely close - textured, with a superior quality of wool and dyes, and a phenom-onal durability. The dull rich colors, which grow richer with age, are reminiscent of Dutch

"Youth Under the 'New Order'" will be discussed at an open forum at 8 tonight in the Wisconsin Union theater, when Profs. Howard Becker of the University of Wisconsin sociology department and Ed-mund Zawicki of the Polish department appear in the second forum-discussion of the summer session program. German and Polish youth

will be stressed by Becker and Zawicki, both of whom spent considerable time in middle Europe. Becker first went to Germany in 1923 as a student and at that time was a member of the national student forum, In 1926 he returned for a year as an exchange student, and in 1934 he was in Germany as a research professor.

Becker's special interest was in the youth movements in the been stamped out or shifted to the Nazi point of view since the coming of the "New Order." Now on file at the university is some of the most complete information on the German youth movements, now extant. German records were destroyed.

Zawicki studied in Poland in 1931 and was representative of the Polish student union at the international student con-gress in Bucharest, Hungary. He taught at the University of Warsaw from 1930 to 1936, and was in Warsaw again in July and August of 1939 just before the outbreak of war.
