

Gene Autry Film To Feature Double Billing Due At Lyric

"Reap The Wild Wind" Showing At Ohio With Story On West Point Life On Screen At Quilna

That silver-tongued son of the saddle, Gene Autry, returns to the screen of the Lyric theatre on Tuesday in "Stardust of the Sage," which will be shown with "House of Errors," starring Charles Rogers, Harry Langdon and Marian Marsh. Showing for the last times Monday are "Thunder Over the Prairie," starring Charles Starrett and "We Go Fast," starring Alan Curtis.

Scaling a modest 320 pounds, (he's been on a diet) and standing a mere six foot five, Laird Cregar is the shrimp of his own family (his five brothers all top him by an inch or more), but he's the biggest super-colossal to hit Hollywood in a long time. Appropriately enough, he's been drawing down bigger and bigger roles since he started in pictures about a year ago, climaxing his progress with a fat part as the principal menace in "Ten Gen-

tleman From West Point," the picture which is now at Quilna theatre.

As a student, by force of circumstance, of the secret of unpopularity, Laird has evolved some interesting ideas as to what makes a hateful personality in a picture. "The main thing to be sure of," he says, "is that you smile and smile when you think things are going wrong for the hero. Shakespeare once said, 'A man may smile and be a villain.' Also, a shrewd movie villain is always unduly careful of his clothes; scowls if a spot gets on them; is meticulous about flicking dust from the lapels of his jacket. Book Reviews

Obtained At The Lima Public Books Reviewed Here May Be Library, Main Library

Toward Freedom, by Janmaharal Nehru. John Day Company, Inc. \$1.00.

Nehru, is of course after Gandhi, the most prominent leader in India. He came from a wealthy family but gave up his position to devote himself to liberating the masses in India. Much of his time has been spent in jail and this autobiography was largely written there.

Nehru writes lucid and skillful prose in an English but he is a formidable son of India. He is a genuinely noble human being and his autobiography is one of the most absorbing personal histories of modern times.

Strictly Personal, by Somerset Maugham. Doubleday, Doran and Company, Inc. \$2.00.

This is not a formal biography. It covers only a few months and the events as they affected Maugham himself. It begins at his visit overlooking the Mediterranean and ends at New York. Between those two points is a perilous journey, in a broken down, over-crowded coal vessel.

He reports brilliantly on the crumbling of the French spirit and makes some sound prophecies in this analysis of what post-war England will be like.

Shakespeare Without Tears, by Margaret Webster. McGraw-Hill Book Company, Inc. \$2.75.

Margaret Webster is famous as a director of Shakespearean plays, particularly those starring Maurice Evans. She writes here some notes on Elizabethan stages and actors, and comments on problems of individual plays. She is informative, chatty, and highly interesting with an abundant sense of humor. For the play-goer there is not an obscure or dull page.

Atlantic Ordeal: The Story Of Mary Cornish, by Elspeth Huxley. Harper and Brothers, \$1.00.

This is the story of Mary Cornish, an Englishwoman assigned as escort on a ship which was carrying children from England to a refuge in Canada. The ship was torpedoed several days out of port and one lifeboat survived to reach land after eight days drifting.

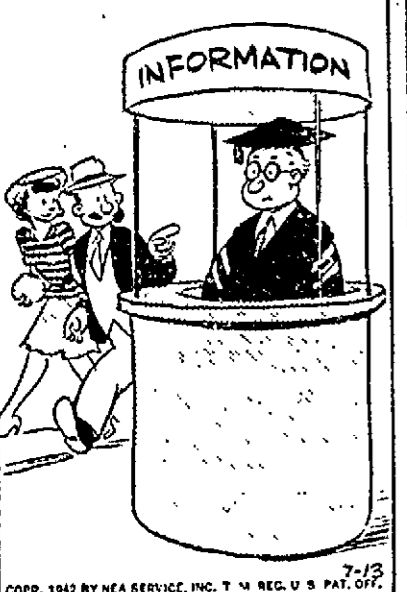
During the dreary hours Mary Cornish invented stories to divert the children from their empty stomachs and parched throats.
