Nervousness Predominant On Wheat Pit

CHICAGO, July 18 \rightarrow (AP) \rightarrow Trading in the wheat pit today exhibited a nervous undertone and closing prices were off fractionally from the preceding session. Other grains followed the bread cereal lower.

Shortly after the opening, wheat dropped 11-2 cents from yesterday's finish with new seasonal lows recorded for September, December and May contracts, July came within 53-4 cents of the seasonal low, established at \$1.09 1-2 on October 17, 1941. The market rallied quickly from

this level, however, on short covering and replacement of holdings by local traders. At the highs, prices got up to about yesterday's closing quotations, but weakness developed again just before the close.

Wheat finished 1-4 to 5-8 lower, July \$1.16 to \$1.157-8, September \$1.17 7-8 to \$1.18 and corn was off 1-4 to 3-8, July 875-8, September 827-8 to 3-4. Oats declined 1-4 to 3-4, rye 1-4 to 3-8 and soybeans were 3-8 lower to 1-4 higher.
