14 Old'Time Tunes, **Dances Feature Folk Festival**

John Jacob Niles to Direct Program Saturday Night

The fiddlin' tunes and ballads of long-ago America, and the rousing rhythms of the old Saturday night dances at the crossroads, will come back to life on the stage of the Wisconsin Union theater when the first Folk Festival to be offered in Madison is held Saturday night.

Directed by John Jacob Niles, who appeared last winter at a Sunday Music hour, and who has spent his life ferreting out the old songs of pioneer America, many of which are still sung in the southern hills, backwoods valleys, and along the rivers, the program will stress both music and dance.

An entire section of the program will be devoted to folk dances, staged by Helen Knight of the women's physical education department at the University of Wisconsin, who will call the figures. A picked group of men and women dancers will present

The university choral group, directed by Paul G. Jones, will offer four folk songs in choral arrangement, "One Morning in May," "The Carrion Crow," "Sing We the Virgin Mary," and "I Wonder as I Wander."

Niles will open the program with a group of ballads, carols, and love songs, sung to the accompaniment of dulcimers.

The selections will be "The Lass from the Low Country," "Go Way from My Window," "Lulle Lullay," "When Jesus Lived in Galilec." "The Wife Wrapt in the Wether's Skin, and "Little Mattie Groves."

Niles will sing an all-request group at the end of the program, and Pro. Carl E. Bricken, director of the school of music, will provide an introduction for the festical.

Many of the songs by Niles were brought to this country by early settlers and have become a part of the folk back-ground of the country. Others apparently originated on this side of the water.

Tickets for the festival will go on sale Monday at the boxoffice of the Wisconsin theater. Reservations can be made by phone.

Library Offers **Books About** War Zones To aid borrowers in acquir-

ing a background of understanding about the troubled regions in the present global war, the Madison Free library has been buying books descriping the resources and population of Australia, Africa, the Far East, and other

areas of conflict. From "down under," the library has obtained the official handbook of Australia, "In-troducing Australia," by C. Harley Grattan, is a more descriptive, though no less au-thentic narrative. Grattan traveled there for the Carnegie Foundation. North Australia was includ-

ed in Frank Clune's extensive journey through the Dutch East Indies. "Isles of Spice" is more than a travel story, for Clune has taken the trouble to give historical and archaeological backgrounds of the places he visited.

About Russia

Two correspondents fa-maliar with the people and resources of our Soviet ally furnish information about Russia. "The Kremlin and the People," by Walter Duranty, and "Hitler Cannot Conquer Russia" appeared last winter and spring. 
