HARDIN-CO ROAD WORK FINISHED

(Lima News Bureau) **KENTON**, July 20—Work of resurfacing various roads in Hardin county has been completed, it was announced by Paul K. Strong, county engineer. It was announced that a total of 81 miles of pavement were resurfaced on 20 different roadways. Included in the amount of material used were 220,000 gallons of tar and 1,000 tons of stone. Total cost of the resurfacing was set at \$31,000. The work yet to be done includes construction of four bridges in various places over the county. It was indicated that no steel will be available for construction of these bridges and consequently they will have to be built with a temporary top. The first of these, the Eagle bridge in Washington, P., south of Dola, was begun Friday.

Book Reviews

Obtained At The Lima Public Books Reviewed Here May Be Library, Main Library

LYRIC
A strange story, distinctly in the "horror" classification, is the basis of "The Corpse Vanishes," the drama which opens an engagement at the Lyric theatre on Tuesday.

Bela Lugosi, playing a role of the type which has established him as the screen's most eerie character, is starred in the picture, and his supporting cast includes many such well-known players as Lanna Walters, Joan Barclay, Tristram Coffin, Gwenn Kenyon, Vince Barnett and Gladys Faye. In the story, several beautiful young brides successively fall in death at the conclusion of their wedding ceremonies, and their bodies mysteriously disappear. It is established that each of the victims has worn a peculiar type of orchid, and thru these flowers suspicion is directed toward Lugosi, who has sent them to the brides anonymously. Eventually the missing girls are found, and with them an amazing explanation of their apparent death, as well as of the member scheme connected by the ruthless Lugosi. The climax is filled with excitement.

THE DUST WHICH IS GOD. By William Rose Benet Dodd, Mead and Co., \$2.50. This is a thinly disguised autobiography telling of one man's life and friendships, of the two dearly loved wives who died, and the third one who brought new love and comfort. The man is the gifted Elmore Wylie. The story is told in blank verse interspersed with lyrics. It is at once a remarkably candid self-revelation and distinguished poetry.

KINGDOM ON EARTH. By Anne Brooks, William Morrow Co., \$2.50. Harriet, the shy daughter of a college professor, married into a wealthy family. The Randolphs were charming, their confidence seemed to Harriet a world apart from the rational, introspective people of her academic background. But she did not realize how much their polite dependency on riches, when their money was lost, the charm went also, and she found herself the mainstay of a group of demoralized individuals.

THE KIMBALL COLLECTION. By Elizabeth Corbett, Appleton-Century Co., \$2.50. This is a new story much in Mrs. Corbett's usual vein, simply told and brightened with witty humor. Kimball, a widower approaching 60, head of a declining business, and with his home filled to overflowing with his son's young family, is beginning to feel that life is over for him.

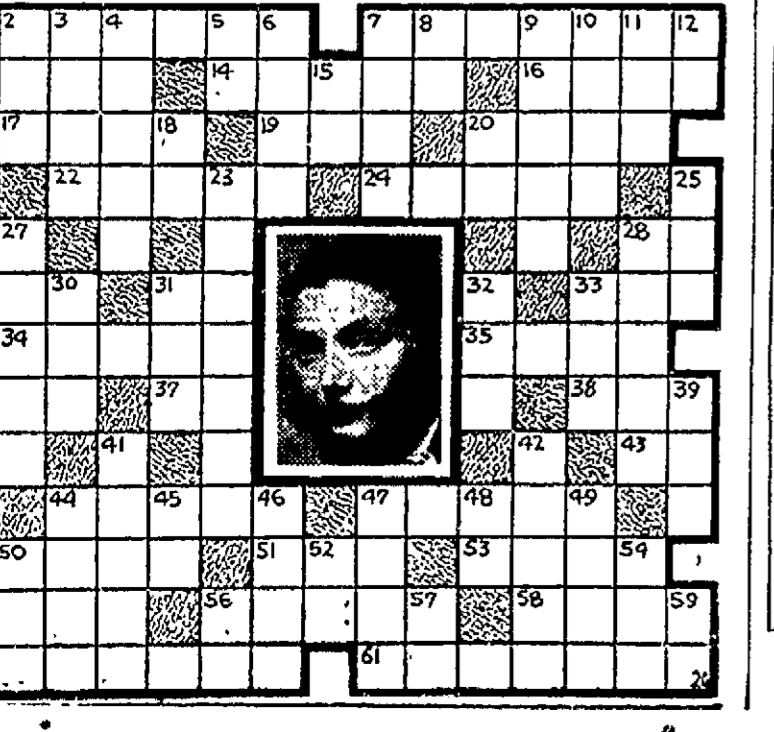
