# **Good Literature** Can Be 'Escape'

#### Library Patrons Have Wide Choice

"The only real escape literature in such times as these is good literature," wrote Elmer Davis in the Saturday Review of Literature a month ago. At the Madison library, staff members are discovering that many borrowers agree with the director of the Office of War Information about the books they want to read. From the recent display of Pulitzer Prize winners, people borrow at least a dozen books daily. Each day's circulation record almost invariably includes books by Nobel prize winners Eigrid Undset,

Pearl Buck, Thomas Mann, and Sinclair Lewis. Well - written adventure stories don't stay on the shelves long. "Moby Dick," "Kidnapped," "Captain Horatio Hornblower," and "The 39 Steps" are in almost continuous circulation. Within the past six months, the library has bought new copies to replace worn-out favorites by Jack London, Joseph Conrad,

and John Buchan. The new edition of Tolstoi's "War and Peace" is so popular that there is a waiting list. Patrons have entered reserves for such "heavy" reading as Goethe's "Faust," Martin's "Story of Philosophy," and "The Basic Writings of Sigmund Freud."

Of course, many are always reading lighter fiction of all kinds, and humor is still popular, During a typical day last week, cardholders borrowed books by Benchley, Ogden Nash, Clarence Day, and James Thurber, But an equal number were interested in sober, and even somber stories ike Huxley's "Eyeless in Gaza," D. H. Lawrence's "Women in Love," Flaubert's "Madame Bovary," Bronte's "Wuthering Heights," and Maxim Gorky's "Bystander". Maxim Gorky's "Bystander."
