Modern Writer Explains

### **Eyewitness Describes** Second Sneak Attack

Hong Kong Fall

There has always been some mystery regarding the quick fall of Hong Kong and the overwhelming of its garrison. The story of a second sneak attack is told for the first time by Richard C. Wilson, United Press Staff Correspondent.

WILSON (Copyright, 1942, by United Press) LOURENCO MARQUES, Portuguese East Africa, July 26—(U.R) —(Delayed)—While the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor, thousands of Japanese troops were sneaking through sewers at Hong Kong to strike at British empire forces from the rear in another "sneak"

At about dawn Monday in Hong Kong, about four hours after the Pearl Harbor attack, a Japanese plane fleet swept over Hong Kong. Air raid sirens wailed but the 1,500,000 residents, mostly Chin-

ese, thought it was a drill.

The planes attacked the Kaitak airport, incidentally destroying the Pan-American airways clip-per plane on which I was about to leave for Manila

Tunnels Forgotten In black, rubber soled shoes, like American overshoes, Japanese troops sent from the Canton area of southern China were sneaking through drainage tunnels which led into the Kowloon British-leased territory on the Chinese mainland across from Hong Kong island. The tunnels had been forgotten by everybody but Japanese

Led by former barbers, clerks, and shopkeepers who for years had lived on the patronage of British and other white residents of Hong Kong, the troops suddenly emerged and made a rear attack on the heavily outnumbered British defenders, and thus Hong Kong had its own counterpart of Pearl Harbor - a counterpart

which there was fatal.

I was sitting in a Pan-American airways bus outside the Hong Kong Peninsula hotel, when the attack began. The bus moved off slowly. A Chinese clerk ran out, Japanese, sneaking up, began to scrambled aboard, and announced shoot them one by one, firing by that the clipper plane on which I was to leave had been "delayed." Q. What soldiers are affected by

A. Privates, privates first class, echnicians fifth class, corporals, technicians fourth class, and line sergeants—any soldier whose base pay is less than \$78 a month. If a soldier holds a rank of staff sergeant or higher, he is incligible under this act.

Q. What dependents are eligi-

Class A dependents, wife and children; Class B dependents, parents, brothers, sisters, and grandchildren. Class A dependents must prove relationships but need not prove dependency; Class B dependents must prove both relationship and dependency.

Q. How much will a dependent

A. The amount varies. A wife will receive \$50 a month, of which the government contributes \$28, the soldier \$22. The government contributes an additional \$12 for one child, \$10 for each additional child, \$15 for one parent, \$25 for two parents, and \$5 for each addi-tional "B" dependent. Q. Who makes application?

A. if possible, the war department urges that the application be made out by the soldier to facilitate handling. If, however, the soldier is missing, besieged, captured or fails to make application, his nearest dependent should make application.

Q. Where can an application be

obtained? A. It can be obtained from the commanding officer of the nearest army post or recruiting station, the commanding general of any corps area, or from the allowance and allotment branch of the adjutant general's office in Washington, D. C.

sent? A. To the allowance and allotment branch of the adjutant general's office, Bldg. Y, 20th and B st., N. E., Washington, D. C.


