In an effort to ease the situation somewhat, AAA leaders said the government will issue loans on the bean crop this year and undertake the storage of it. This is the first time in AAA history that loans will be made on the beans, Williams said. The program is -similar to that now in effect for

While the market price of soybeans next October can only be estimated, the government has already set up loan rates, designed to help the farmer benefit from his crop despite the fact that he probably will not be able to market it. Soybeans are regarded as a war crop and as a result, any person raising them will be eligible -to secure a loan, altho they may not hold membership in the AAA, Williams stated.
