## Metropolitan **Faces Season Optimistically**

NEW YORK -(U.R)- The Mecropolitan Opera, under a senedule of lowered prices des gned to increase attendance, is proceeding with plans for 21. 1942-1943 season with a reasonable degree of optimism. The Opera assn. has just issued a comprehensive statement of operations, the first to be made available to the pubhe in the 59-year-old history of the Metropolitan. Ten thousand copies of the statement will be sent to friends of the Metropolitan, including pscribers and contributors to the Metropolitan Opera fund proseghout the United States, as well as to guarantors of the opera tour in cities where performances have been given in

the last few years. The report does not preclude a curtomary deficit next season, but it shows a healthy condition to start with and indicates continuance of the opera beyond this second "var" season if public support

Has Cash Reserve

The report of Cornelius N. Bls, chairman of the board. total cash reserves as of May 31, 1942, of \$417,437, This includes a balance of \$305,934 from the \$1,000,000 opera fund campaign, the remainder of which was used to purchase the opera house, make interper improvements, provide new productions and for the legal and other cests.

From the \$417,437 cash on bend, it is estimated that expenses entailed before the new season opens will be \$292,000, leaving an operating cost margin of \$125,437 for the actual season, which may be exceeded. (The operating deficit for the 1941-42 season was \$148,-

In his report, however, Chairman Bliss warned: "It is obvious from the finuncial position of the association that if a substantial deficit should result from next season's operations there will be a serious possibility of interruption of the Metropolitan's production of opera for

the past half contury. Will Expand "Despite the many difficult problems which remain to be solved and the grave uncerminutes of the war years, we feel that we may approach the future with a measure of confidence, our objective being not merely to 'save' the opera - for that implies a static point of view-but to continue to expand its usefulness to the City of New York and to
