Don't Judge Book by Movie, Since Resemblance So Often. Appears Only a Coincidence

Don't judge a book by its movie only, advises the Madison Free library, where requests for a book to be filmed are often noted long before the movie appears at Madison theaters. Since any resemblance to the book is often coincidental, seasoned readers and moviegoers make it a point to read the book as well as see

"Mrs. Miniver," for instance, evolved as a well-knit screen story from a book, which like "Penrod" and "Life With Father," is not a novel, but a group of short narratives concerned with a

central character. On the other hand, the scope and detail of "How Green Was My Val-ley" had to be narrowed down to fit cimematic limitations. "This Above All" treated only the romantic thread of Eric Knight's novel, and eliminated all the thoughtful criticism which made it a significant war novel.

Some Make Fine Movies Hollywood's revisions of prize-winning novels often make excellent movies as in the case of Ellen Glasgow's "In This Our Life;" Margaret Mitchell's "Gone With the Wind," and John Steinback's "Grapes of Wrath," "Mutiny on the Bounty" was so, successful that admirers of other adventure stories wonder why producers have not yet filmed 'Capt. Horatio Hornblower"

and "In Hazard." Although discriminating readers object to Hollywood's tacking happy endings on such books as "Alice Adams,"
"My Son, My Son," and "Before the Fact" which appeared as the movie "Suspicion" many theatergoors first discover the books of a favorite author by means of a movie. Production of classics like "Les Miserables," "Treasure Island," "Wuthering Heights." and "Pride and Prejudice" have caused a resurgence of popular interest in these

novels. On the other hand, movie makers are not insensible to the benefits derived from capitalizing on interest in a popular current publication Bennett Cerf, writing in a recent issue of the Saturday Review of Literature, observed that "in the past year, the studies, starved for top grade material, have begun to dip their fingers into the magic pool of the Book-of-the-Month club books and have discovered that the water is fine."



Schillinger Says His Method Could Have Helped Beethoven

By ROBERT MUSEL NEW YORK -(U.P)- For years music men have been telling me about the "Schillinger method" and the amaz-ing recluse whose "Mathemetical Basis of the Arts" is designed to make any normal person as much of a musical genius as was, say, Beethoven. So I went to see him. Joseph Schillinger doesn't care much about being seen. He lives in an apartment high above Fifth ave. where he is quite content to devote his time to a limited number of students (George Gershwin was one), and to extension of his theory

to other fields—chemistry and biology, for instance. It was on the eve of his annual vacation so he agreed to talk to me. We went from a room decorated with miniature totem poles, to another featured by some complex music - recording equipment and finally to his own studio. This room had a magnificent electric organ, a grand piano of unique design, and a phonograph-radio with a remote control loudspeaker.

Designs Frame The walls were decorated with designs created by students who have applied his theories to the field of art. One picture had an odd frame and Schillinger explained that it was the first frame ever made to conform mathematically to the design it

outlined. "The framemaker thought I was crazy," he said, "but I insisted on a certain depth to the wood, certain contours and I wanted a couple of corners to jut out. After it was done, though, the frame-maker asked my permission to reproduce it for others. I told him he could, except that this particular frame would fit only the design I gave him to enclose."

Schillinger, Russian - born, speaks precise English with a slight foreign shading. He is mild in appearance, of middle height, and friendly in a quiet way. His accomplishments at 47 are staggering for one so little known, although he has lectured in a dozen American schools and colleges.
His "Mathematical Basis of

the Arts"-as I discovered in three interesting hours - is a tremendous work of some 33 volumes which explains that music, literature, painting, and design, among other things, follow mathematical laws which can be taught rather simply (four years for

an adept). Genius, he said, is 85 per cent tradition and 15 per cent originality. More than 15 per cent originality would lift a genius beyond the comprehension of his contemporaries, and probably through the ages many a genius has gone un-

recognized because of this. "They," said Schillinger, "probably thought he was crazy at the time . . . like the century musicions in whose almost forgotten works I find the most modern of chord construction."

Schillinger -- who was a child prodigy himself -- said that the 15 per cent advantage a genius has can be acquired easily by proper study. Generally speaking, he doesn't think much of most of our accepted musical geniuses because to his mathematical mind their techniques are so

readily apparent. "Poor Beethoven," he said. "I saw his manuscript of the Fifth symphony and he crossed out one theme at least 20 times. He would have been able to do it right the first time had he merely applied correct principles instead of relying on genius."


