

Romantic Comedy To Head Program At Quilna Theatre

Eagle Squadron, War Film, Opens Saturday At Ohio; Action Drama At Lyric

"They All Kissed the Bride," a romantic comedy of a millionaire business woman who met a penniless lug, is the treat scheduled to open Friday evening at the Quilna theatre, with Melvyn Douglas and Joan Crawford in the leading roles. Also booked is "Parachute Nurse," while the concluding films are "Blondie's Blessed Event," and "Desperate Chance For Ellery Queen."

In "Eagle Squadron," the film scheduled to open Saturday at the Ohio theatre, movie moguls have notably achieved the screen's first authentic story of the great war both in the air and on the land. Robert Stack has the leading role as a young Californian who joins the R.A.F. Showing for the last times Thursday and Friday is "Pardon My Sarong," starring Bud Abbott and Lou Costello.

The Sigma theatre double bill is headed by "Affairs of Martha," sprightly comedy of a girl who took the starch out of society's stuffed shirts. Marsha Hunt and Richard Carlson have the leading roles. Also showing is "Spy Ship," starring Craig Stevens and Irene Manning. Commencing Saturday are "The Invisible Agent" and "Rubber Racketeers."

Gun-flaming action marks the new Bill Elliott-Tex Ritter outdoor action drama at the Lyric theatre, "Roaring Frontiers," which commences Friday with "Fangs of the Wild." For the last times Thursday the theatre offers the chilling double feature, "The Mad Monster" and "The Strangler."

"The Mystery of Marie Roget," based on the immortal tale by Edgar Allan Poe, is the new feature at the State theatre. Maria Montez and Patric Knowles head the notable cast that includes Maria Cuspenkaya, John Littel, Edward Norris and Lloyd Corrigan. The co-feature is "Henry and Dizzy," another episode in the cinema life of Henry Aldrich.

The ghost is walking again on the screen. From Universal studios, long famed for a succession of "out of this world" film sensations dating from "Phantom of the Opera," a new fantastic production, "Invisible Agent," comes Saturday to the Sigma theatre.

Iona Massey and Jon Hall are co-starring in the film while Peter Lorre, Sir Cedric Hardwicke, J. Edward Bromberg and John Littel have featured roles. Albert Basserman and Keye Luke will be seen in prominent supporting parts.

"Invisible Agent" is the latest of a series of unique melodramas beginning with the pictureization of H. G. Wells' best seller, "Invisible Man," which was produced several years ago by Universal. In the interim there have been sequels, "Invisible Man Returns," and "Invisible Woman," to perpetuate the extraordinary cycle whose success is lucidly attested to both by box-office returns and flattering editorial and word-of-mouth comment.

The newcomer is described as an inspired and highly imaginative dramatization of the adventures of a daring United Nations' secret operative. Because of his ability to strip off his clothes and achieve invisibility, he is able to penetrate enemy headquarters in Europe and ferret out guarded military secrets.

Spotted in the key and tantalizing role is Jon Hall, recently exploited as an American flier in the R.A.F. in Walter Wanger's "Eagle Squadron."

One of the finest comedy casts ever assembled, in what Hollywood regards as one of the most gaily tender comedies of the season, may be seen Friday evening at the Quilna theatre, where "They All Kissed the Bride" will co-star Joan Crawford and Melvyn Douglas. Miss Crawford, forsaking her recent appearances in drama to revert to the type of comedy characterization which made her world-famous, also returns to dancing for the first time in years. Roland Young, Billie Burke, and Allen Jenkins head the top-flight supporting cast.

mous "royal family" of stage and screen, proves by her performance that she is a notable newcomer to the cinema.

Likewise worthy of praise is the work of such well known players as Jon Hall, Eddie Albert, Nigel Bruce, Evelyn Ankers, Leif Erikson, John Loder, Edgar Barrier, Isabel Elsom, Gladys Cooper, Paul Cavanagh, Richard Davies, Jill Esmond, Gene Reynolds, Alan Hale, Jr., and many others.

"Eagle Squadron" in fact, has the record number of 98 speaking parts and all of them are poignantly dramatic.

The authenticity and realism of the film has its counterpart in the warm human story of the fighter pilot and the WAAP girl. In their line of duty, the screen unfolds modern war in the clouds, a night raid by the dreaded British Commandos of headline fame, and the women in this war who fly transport planes, operate radio communications to the fighter and bomber pilots, and fire anti-aircraft guns.

Not the least gripping feature is the foreword written and spoken by Quentin Reynolds, noted American war correspondent, who returned from England for this task. His first sentence sets the feeling of the entire picture: "This is the story of some of our countrymen who did not wait to be stabilized in the back."

CON MEN USE WAR GOODS AS LATEST LURE

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Aug. 27—(UP)—War racketeers, peddling special air raid sand, chewing gum tires, tricky insurance policies and other swindles, are finding rich pickings in war-minded San Diego, Charles Gurley, Better Business bureau manager, reports.

San Diego, one of the nation's defense boom towns, is also facing a boom in the rackets, Gurley warned, and cited examples of some of the confidence schemes practiced.

Faked physical examinations for selective service registrants, worthless "bootlegged" tires, beautifully-engraved oil stock ("now more valuable than ever because of gasoline and oil shortages") are only a few of the tricks designed to take advantage of the present emergency.

Skeptical is the best attitude when approached with bargains in air raid sand or new schemes to solve the rubber shortage, Gurley advised.

"Everytime you fall for a shady promotion, you waste money, which would do great good if turned over to a reliable agency," Gurley emphasized.

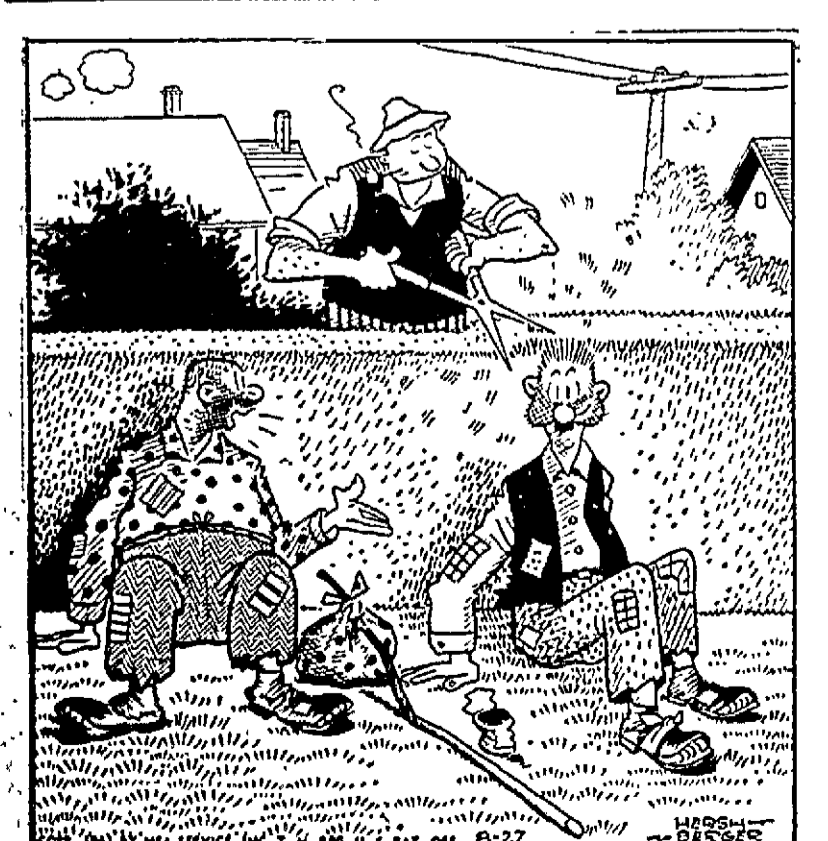
