It will be versatility week for Margo, American song and dance star on the Caravan Hour, Friday at 10 p. m. when she will sing, play the castanets, and be starred in a "Smoke Ring" spot written by Milton Geiger. Connie Roswell sings "Be Careful It's My Heart," and "This Is Worth Fighting For." Xavier Cugat will play "The Peanut Vendor," "Morena," with Margo on the castanets. "Tabu," with the Latin singer, Santos, and a medley of Polka routines which will be sung by Lanny, Connie and Margo. Edward Ellis will narrate the "Our Town" Sketch and Herb Shriner will contribute the comedy. Bill Bacher is the producer of the show.

ONE-THIRD OF COUNTY SCHOOL STAFF IS NEW

4,200 Pupils Will Find 51 Unfamiliar Faces At Opening On Monday

When the 4,200 pupils of the Allen-co school system return to their classes next week they will see many new faces on the staffs of the various school districts. The 1942-43 school year officially opens on Tuesday, Sept. 8, although actual class sessions probably will not get under way in the schools until later in the week. The first part of the week will be devoted to organizing and completing details.

Due to war conditions, it has been necessary to replace 51 of the 149 teachers who make up the faculties for all schools in the system. Also it was necessary to give employment to 21 married women to fill vacancies which existed. County Supt. Willard M. Floyd said. The 51 new teachers include five men and 46 women.

Altho a couple of teaching posts have not been filled, Supt. Floyd believed it would be possible to fill them by the time school sessions open so that classes will not be retarded.

On Monday, Sept. 7, teachers will meet with local executives to work out final details. Tuesday, when all pupils will first attend school sessions, will be taken up largely with completing schedules, issuing textbooks and the multitude of things which pop up at the last minute. Most schools plan to be functioning smoothly with class sessions by Wednesday.

13 TEACHERS IN ARMED SERVICES

Allen-co schools have been touched heavily by the draft as a total of 13 men teachers have been taken by that route into the U. S. Army. One teacher, Harold Murfin of Beaverdam, enlisted in the Navy. Other vacancies were caused by men entering the war industries and by other matters incident to the war and the war effort.

Shawnee was hardest hit by the draft when three teachers were taken: Charles Weaver, Wilbur Bricker, and Charles Hornell.
