New Books Serve as Guides to Enjoyment of Good Music

"You do not have to read this, or any other book to enjoy good music," says Robert Simon in his introduction to "Be Your Own Music Critic." But reading evidently helps, or Simon wouldn't have published his volume. It is among the recent books on display at the Madison Free library for listeners who want to increase their enjoyment of next season's musical offerings. There are also books for amateur performers and record collec-

"Be Your Own Music Critic" is a series of nontechnical shop talks on various branches of the art. Olin Downes, critic; Albert Spalding, violinist; George Barerre, flute player; Harl MacDonald, composer; and Egan Petri, pianist, are a few of the men who discuss their respective specialties. In addition to musical history and descriptions of instrumental technique, the reader will encounter stimulating discussions of possible new electric musical instruments, proposals for an all-brass orchestra, and comparisons of the relative broadmindedness of audiences in Beethoven's

day and ours. Douglas Moore attempts to convey the spirit of each of several periods of music in From Madrigal to Modern Music." The pages on chamber music will be of special interest to those who look forward to the Pro Arte series this year.

Paul Henry Lang's "Music in Western Civilization" is so comprehensive that it may be forbidding to all except readers bent on knowing as much as possible about the history of the art. McKinney and Anderson's "Music in History" is similar in viewpoint, and no less authentic: but it is shorter, and more popular in writ-

Fred Barton advocates "hanging all young squirts who maltreat familiar classics with their jazz bands," but he is all for people playing plano by ear, singing together, and organizing neighborhood or-chestras. "Music as a Hobby" is a breezy set of suggestions for having fun as a performer and as a listener. Emphasis is on the fun of performance. Those who want to follow Barton's suggestions may borrow Charles Cooke's advice on "Playing the Piano for Pleasure," or take home a few song books. The newest of these is "Sound Off," an anthology of soldier's songs from the Revolution to World War

"The Jazz Record Book" does for popular music of the past few decades what David Hall's "Record Book" and supplement do for the recordings of classics. More , than 1,000 famous jazz records are analyzed as to soloist, band, period, and style. Opening chapters are a detailed history of jazz in America.
