THREE TYPES OF SWING MUSIC OFFERED IN QUILNA FUNFILM

Lyric Brings Hilarious Farce For Midnight Showing; "Broadway" Opens At State Theatre Sunday

NAZIS PREDICT DAKAR ATTACK

LONDON, Sept. 26 — (INS) — The Nazi-controlled Paris radio, after claiming yesterday that the Allies soon would attack Dakar in French West Africa, asserted today that the United Nations were blockading the African port. Reuters reported. "The Allies are blockading Dakar and they will attack it soon," the broadcast said. "They will take our sugar, timber and cotton as they already are doing at Gabon (French equatorial Africa, now in control of the fighting French)." Concerning the situation on the French island of Madagascar off the east coast of Africa, the Paris radio said that Governor Armand Annet, after fleeing from the capital of Tananarive before its occupation by British forces, had established new headquarters at Fort Dauphin "from where he will continue to resist."

Mrs. Knute Rockne To Appear With Bill Stern On Saturday

Notre Dame Coach's Widow Will Be Heard From Site Of Irish-Wisconsin Game In Afternoon

Bill Stern, one of the nation's top commentators, will have Mrs. Knute Rockne, widow of the immortal coach of Notre Dame, as his guest on the Sports Newsreel, Saturday at 10 p. m. over WEAZ.

The Saturday night broadcast will be heard from Madison, Wis., from where Stern will be broadcasting the Notre Dame-Wisconsin football game that afternoon.

The Stern program has added 69 new stations and is now heard on a total of 125 stations on the Red network.

In addition to the coast to coast station line-up, the Bill Stern program is rebroadcast by short wave to America's troops in all parts of the globe. The rebroadcast to Army and Navy outposts was by popular request of servicemen. Hundreds of letters of appreciation have been received from men in the armed forces stationed at far-away outposts, attesting to the popularity of the Stern program.

John Gunther, newest acquisition to the WJZ network's imposing corps of commentators and analysts, will offer the nation a personalized story of the life and career of a fellow WJZ newscaster, Raymond Gram Swing, in a special broadcast at 10:30 p. m.

In a 10-minute history, Gunther will present a "Roswell" of his close friend, who inaugurates his own series of Monday thru Thursday news analyses over the network the following Monday, at 10 p. m.

Biographer Gunther will, from his own knowledge of Swing, provide a glimpse into Swing's childhood, family background, his love of music and early days as a cub reporter on the Cleveland Press. He will recount Swing's rise to
