Coen, U. W. Man, Changes Forces

Transfers to U. S. Group from RAF

A University of Wisconsin graduate, Capt. Oscar H. Coen, was listed among the three American Eagle squadrons who exchanged the Royal Air Force blue for the khaki of the United States army air forces in England Tuesday, it was learned today.

Capt. Coen, news dispatches said, and his comrade fliers came into U. S. service after having destroyed 73 1/2 enemy aircraft while flying with the British. The half was part of a Dornier flying boat shared with a British squadron.

Graduated in 1939
Now 25, Capt. Coen said he had thought of nothing since Dec. 7 except a chance to fight in his own country's uniform. He was graduated in 1939 from the university here, records disclosed, majoring in agriculture and education. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Coen, lived at route 1, Pound, Wis., at that time. At present Capt. Coen's home address is Carbondale, Ill.

The Badger flier taught agriculture at Thompson, Ill., high school before going to Britain 20 months ago, he told newsmen. "The main reason I came over here," he said, "was the hope that I would get into the American air force. I was 'washed out' for flying deficiency at Randolph Field, Tex."

Capt. Coen and the other Americans now are members of the No. 4 pursuit group, eighth United States air force, and have been flying as members of squadrons 71, 121, and 133 of the RAF. They will continue to use British Spitfire planes, they said.

"Good Hunting"
Air Chief Marshal Sir William Sholto Douglas, commanding the British fighter command, wished the Americans farewell and "good hunting" Tuesday, while Maj. Gen. Carl Spaatz, chief of the United States Air Forces in the European War theater, and Brig. Gen. Frank O'D Hunter, commanding general of the fighter command, welcomed them into the U. S. ranks.

The Americans received the U. S. wing insignia at Tuesday's ceremonies, and expressed keenest pleasure at being back with their "own crowd."

HOLLYWOOD—(U.P.)—Screen Actor Lyle Talbot will join the air corps next week with his domestic affairs settled—thanks to the "patriotic gesture" of his former wife, Estymme Adams, actress-model, who suddenly terminated her alimony suit against him.

Miss Adams, seeking \$250 alimony, halted court action Thursday and waived both temporary and permanent rights to the support money. Through her attorney, Charles Katz, she said that "as a patriotic gesture" she would be satisfied with an annulment of her marriage.

Judge William S. Baird granted the decree on the grounds of fraud. Miss Adams testified that the actor had broken a pre-nuptial promise to give up drinking.

Miss Adams, in terminating her suit, also dropped an alternate demand for a divorce on cruelty grounds in which she had asked a share in community property valued at \$5,000. The couple was married in Kansas City last Jan. 22 and separated three months later.

U. S. Planes Prove Best, Group Finds

Sub-Committee Will Report on 4-to-1 Ratio

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—A house military affairs sub-committee investigating the air phases of the war effort will report in a few days that American planes have shot down Japanese planes at a ratio of four to one in the Battle of the Pacific, the United Press learned today.

The sub-committee will state in a comprehensive report covering the performance record of American-built planes that American fighters and bombers have proved on every front to be able to fight it out with the Axis on an equal footing.

The report will assert that even though the Japanese Zero—which has been reported in dispatches from the Pacific to be superior to any American plane which has yet

reached the firing line—can out-climb and outmaneuver American fighters, the combat record so far has demonstrated that the Zero cannot outfight American planes.

State Suicides Hit 16-Year Low

Board Cites War as Probable Reason
The lowest suicide rate for Wisconsin in 16 years was recorded in the quarterly bulletin of the state board of health issued today, and the reason probably is the war.

If the experiences of the last war are borne out, a steady decline in the rate until at least two years after the war can be expected, the study revealed.
