

Big Upturn Looms In Hog Slaughtering

Increased Run Is Expected To Start Shortly

CHICAGO, Oct. 3—(Wide World)—A rise of about 25 per cent in hogs slaughtered in the last three months this year, as compared with the same period of 1941, was forecast today of the Department of Agriculture. The department said the increased run should be getting underway soon.

Beef cattle marketings will continue to be large and lamb supplies probably will be only slightly under a year ago, according to the department's forecast.

About 19,000,000 head of hogs will be slaughtered under federal inspection in the last quarter this year, the department said, which would be 5,000,000 more than in October-December last year. Officials felt the high supply would not create any sharp price reaction.

"With lend-lease and domestic consumer purchases of hog products expected to be stepped up sharply in the coming week," the report stated, "total demand for hogs appears great enough to absorb the large seasonal increase in supplies at prices not much lower than those which prevailed during the last several months."

The expected upturn has not been shown so far, however, and the small runs at major centers this week sent prices to new 22-year peaks. Actually, the supply this week was smaller than in the same week last year, despite a 25 per cent upturn in spring pig production.

Livestock men said the point is being reached where one hog is considered as good as another. Heavy butchers, usually sold at a discount, are now bringing nearly as much as choice light weights. The spread between the average price and the top price is growing considerably narrower.

Hogs closed this week at a top of \$15.70 a hundred pounds, highest since October, 1920. Gains ranged to about 50 cents. Steer prices closed weak to 25 cents down, although \$17 was paid for prime offerings on one day of the week. Spring lambs and yearlings drifted downward, closing around 25 cents lower.

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Heavy Trading Adds Recovery To Stock List

NEW YORK, Oct. 3—(AP)—The stock market swung to further recovery heights today on the second largest Saturday turnover of the year, although profit-taking in the wake of the past week's substantial advance restricted plus marks in most cases to fractions.

As in the preceding session, when dealings were the liveliest since last December, steels and rails were fastest movers.

The President's decree putting the wage-price law into effect came just before the finish but failed to prove an unsettling factor.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up 2 of a point at 38.7, equaling its previous 1942 top established last January. On the week it showed a net advance of 8 in addition to a gain of 8 the week before. Transfers of 445,920 shares were the best for any two-hour day since Jan. 3. In the preceding Saturday volume was 226,825 shares.

Peak marks for 1 to 5 years were registered for Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, Southern Pacific, Union Pacific, Southern Railway preferred, General Motors, U. S. Rubber preferred and E-Cell-O Corp. Better performers included U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Crucible Steel, Chrysler, Western Union, Douglas Aircraft, Sperry, United Aircraft, Du Pont, Westinghouse, Standard Oil (NJ) and U. S. Gypsum.

Goodyear slipped after an early run-up. United Fruit dropped 1/4 on revived fears of another dividend cut. A trifling lower were Sears Roebuck, Consolidated Edison, Public Service of N. J., U. S. Rubber common, Great Northern and Deere.
