

## "Duffy's Tavern" Sets Grand Reopening For October 6

Comedy Skit To Share Honors With Fighting Marine And Famous Jury Trial Tuesday Night

Duffy's Tavern, the "poor man's Stork Club," with Ed Gardner in the starring role, returns to the air Tuesday, at 8:30 p. m. over WJZ.

"Duffy's Tavern" was hailed last season as one of the outstanding new program developments of the year. The comedy show is the creation of Ed Gardner, former radio producer and writer, who plays the role of Archie, the harassed counterman in Duffy's place — "where the elite meet to eat."

The scene of the entire series is the Tavern, where Archie holds forth as counterman and manager. The characters include Miss Duffy, the boss' daughter; Eddie, the waiter; Finnegan, a constant but not so bright customer, and others who patronize the joint in spite of Archie's insults. Most of the time the manager is trying to improve the tone of the Tavern in hopes of drawing the carriage trade.

Pvt. Francis Pline, U. S. Marines, a 1940 graduate of Father Edward Joseph Flanagan's famous Boys Town in Nebraska who has already seen considerable action in this war, is to be introduced by the air in *Giving Simmes* Tuesday at 8:00 p. m. over WEAF.

An accused cop-killer with a previous criminal record will be up before the Blue Network jury when the case of "The People Versus Mike Doran" takes to the air during "Famous Jury Trials" Tuesday at 9:00 p. m., EWT.

Mike Doran, an escaped convict, was captured suspiciously near the bodies of two recently murdered policemen. The law charged the fugitive with murder but as Doran was unarmed when caught, the case was far from air-tight.

The defense proved that while Doran was being held at the local police station awaiting extradition for a previous crime, his jailers had allowed him to become a trustee and even a drinking companion.

Altho the original jury took three days to reach a decision the Blue web jury, despite sensational charges which will be batted back and forth, will reach their verdict during the broadcast.




## 13 ACCEPTED BY MARINE CORPS

## Orson Welles Picture Has Top Rank At Sigma Theatre

Jean Arthur, Cary Grant Starred In Sensational Film Now Showing At Quilna

How wealth and power, built up thru three generations, crashes into oblivion under the blows of an advancing machine age is absorbingly pictured in "The Magnificent Ambersons," a forceful drama of the 1885-1913, which commences Tuesday at the Sigma theatre. It is Orson Welles second film venture, only in this one he does not portray a dramatic role. The second film is "Isle of Missing Men," starring John Howard.

The efforts of an amateur secret-service agent to round up an enemy spy ring at night while he runs his band in the daytime provide the hilarious basis of "My Favorite Spy," Kay Kyser's new vehicle at the State theatre. Rosalind Russell and Fred MacMurray are the stars of the co-starring, "Take a Letter, Darling," with Robert Benchley and Constance Moore in supporting roles.

"The Talk of the Town" is the current sensation at the Quilna theatre with Cary Grant, Jean Arthur and Ronald Colman in the starring roles. Grant is seen as a fugitive from justice, Colman as the candidate for the Supreme Court Bench and Miss Arthur as the warm-hearted young woman who shuns their adventures.

Sluggish Lou Gehrig is the role portrayed by Gary Cooper in the current Ohio film, "The Pride of the Yankees," a chronicle of the career of one of baseball's best-beloved characters. Teresa Wright and Walter Brennan portray prominent roles in the film, in which appear also Babe Ruth, Mark Koenig, Bill Dickey, and other Ruthian era teammates. Jack Benny's first film effort is re-named and offered at the Lyric theatre as "Keep 'Em Laughing," with the Boswell Sisters offering the vocal music, and Gene Raymond and Fannie Parker in prominent roles. Also on tap at the Sigma is "Bedtime Story," starring Frederic March and Loretta Young.
